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## **2019-2023 Adopted Capital Improvement Program**

### **Art in Public Places**

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In developing the 2019-2023 Adopted Capital Improvement Program (CIP), staff reviewed each capital program for public art funding based on revisions to the Public Art Master Plan approved by the City Council on March 13, 2007 and in accordance with Chapter 22.08 (Art in Public Places) of the San José Municipal Code. One percent of all construction project funding is required to be allocated to public art, excluding funding for seismic and ADA retrofits, rehabilitation, maintenance and operations, non-construction projects (such as studies), or affordable housing. The exclusion of Public Art for the Water Pollution Control Plan project is assumed in this CIP. Attached is a breakdown of public art allocations in the 2019-2023 Adopted Capital Improvement Program (Attachment A) and a sampling of projects that are currently being developed (Attachment B).

As shown in Attachment A, a total of \$6.1 million is programmed for public art projects in the 2019-2023 Adopted CIP. This figure does not include the \$1.6 million in public art expenditures for 2017-2018. It also excludes outside funding from grants and consulting projects being managed by San José's Public Art Program staff. Due to the outreach and development process, the timing and completion of the projects may vary from when the funding for a project is allocated. Funds will be recommended to be carried over (rebudgeted) from 2017-2018 to 2018-2019 as necessary as part of the 2017-2018 Annual Report.

The Airport Capital Program has allocated an additional \$500,000 in 2018-2019 towards permanent artwork to be located at Terminal B. The Airport funding is being reinitiated as per Council direction and under the Public Art Ordinance as the deferment period ended when activity levels reached 12.3 million passengers in November, 2017.

The sample project list that follows (Attachment B) includes major highlights of some of the public art projects funded through the Public Art allocations in this CIP. Given the scope and schedule of specific public art projects still under development, and determined as funding allows, not all public art projects are reflected in this document. Further detail and discussion of all specific public art projects can be found in the Annual Status Report on the City-wide Capital Improvement Program. The most recent report was accepted by the City Council on June 12, 2017.

In accordance with the San José Municipal Code, the attached worksheets will be submitted to the Arts Commission for review in May 2018.

# Art in Public Places

## Performance Measures

A set of consistent and comprehensive performance measurements along with targets and goals have been established for the entire capital program and adopted for each individual CSA. Measures focus on schedule (cycle time) and project delivery cost. Please see the Budget Guide section narrative for additional information on capital performance measures. While its investment spans across each CSA, performance measures for Public Art are presented below for ease of reference.

1 The number of projects may vary from the 2016-2017 Adopted Budget Estimate as a result of the date of the estimated beneficial use of the project being revised with the project expected to be delivered in the following fiscal year, as well as the inclusion of projects in the 2016-2017 Actual not originally included in the estimate due to incomplete information at that time.

2 Projects are considered "completed" when final cost accounting has occurred and the project has been accepted; projects are considered "on budget" when the total expenditures do not exceed 101% of the baseline budget.

In 2017-2018, an estimated 15 of 15 projects are expected to be completed within their baseline budgets. Notable Public Art projects estimated to be delivered in 2017-2018 include a large bronze installation at the Berryessa BART station; FOGwaste Storm/Sanitary awareness project phase II; Twelve (12) Murals at the TJ Martin and Fontana Parks; and the Paul Moore Park Mural.
