TAKE THE PLEDGE

- Replace at least one car trip a month with walking, biking, or using public transit.
- Recycle 100% of my newspaper, glass, plastic and aluminum at home.

Easy Ways to Go Green

With "going green" being all the rage these days, how easy is it? Very! All it takes is using energy, garbage, water and fuel a little more wisely around your home.

Already turning off the tap while brushing your teeth? Already recycling 100% of your newspapers, glass, plastic and aluminum at home? How about replacing at least one car trip a month with walking, biking or using public transit? If so, then all you have to do is replace

five regular light bulbs with compact fluorescent light bulbs (called CFLs) and you've met San José's 2008 Environmental Pledge (see sidebar).

*CFLs contain mercury, so used ones cannot be thrown in your garbage or recycling carts. To safely dispose of CLFs, call the County's Household Hazardous Waste Program at (408) 299-7300 to schedule a free drop-off appointment. The environment is directly impacted by what we buy and how we manage natural resources. By making a few simple changes, we can help reduce carbon dioxide emissions — the main contributor to global warming. Cost savings also add up.

San José's Green Vision

A bold 15-year plan for San José to become America's greenest city has been adopted by the City Council. The ten Green Vision goals that follow are supported by more than 150 actions that the City will be taking in cooperation with its citizens and businesses. Taken together, they will add jobs, grow the economy, and help the environment.

- 1. Create 25,000 clean tech jobs as the World Center of Clean Tech Innovation
- 2. Reduce per capita energy use by 50 percent
- 3. Receive 100 percent of our electrical power from clean renewable sources
- 4. Build or retrofit 50 million square feet of green buildings

- 5. Divert 100 percent of the waste from our landfill and convert waste to energy
- 6. Recycle or beneficially reuse 100 percent of our wastewater (100 million gallons per day)
- 7. Adopt a General Plan with measurable standards for sustainable development
- 8. Ensure that 100 percent of public fleet vehicles run on alternative fuels
- 9. Plant 100,000 new trees and replace 100 percent of our streetlights with smart, zero emission lighting
- 10. Create 100 miles of interconnected trails

Q: What's all the fuss over plastic bags?

A: Less than four percent of the 27 billion plastic bags used by Californians annually are re-



cycled. Too many end up as road litter or strangle our waterways and wildlife. Also, it takes about three million barrels of oil to manufacture these bags — unlike cloth or other reusable bags. The eco-friendly choice is to switch to reusable bags.

Q: I heard we won't be able to throw "medical sharps in the garbage anymore. How can I dispose of them? A: That's right. As of September 1, 2008, State law will prohibit the disposal of sharps (syringes, hypodermic needles, lancets, etc.) in either household garbage or recycling carts.



Check first with your supplier or pharmacy to see if they have a take-back or mail-back program. If not, call the County's Household Hazardous Waste (HHW) program at (408) 299-7300 or go online at *www.hhw.org* to schedule a free drop-off appointment. Remember, always package your sharps in an approved, red commercial bio-hazard container, available at most drug stores.



Spotlight: Taking Environmental Action

Here are some fun things for families to try this spring and summer, all the while helping make San José a "cleaner and greener" city.

Adopt-A-Park and Adopt-A-Trail are City volunteer programs that help keep neighborhood parks and trails clean and beautiful by picking up litter, removing graffiti, raking leaves, pulling weeds, and planting native plants. Call (408) 793-4190 or visit www.sjadoptapark.org for "adoption"

Pick-Up San José offers free supplies (litter pick-up sticks, safety vests, gloves, and litter bags) to volunteers interested in organizing school yard, park, or neighborhood cleanups. Call (408) 277-3208 for details.

Work with Our City Forest (www.ourcityforest.org) to

organize a tree planting for your neighborhood, school, or work site. A single tree will absorb one ton of carbon dioxide over its lifetime. In addition to storing carbon, trees in urban areas can provide much-needed shade in the summer, reducing energy bills and fossil fuel use.
