# SUBJECT: MARCH 2011 UPDATE ON CITY RECOVERY ACT EFFORTS

Last month marked the two year anniversary of the American Recovery and Reinvestment Act of 2009 (Recovery Act). During the two years since its passage, City staff have been successful in securing nearly \$110 million in Recovery Act funds through a combination of formula and competitive allocations to support a wide variety of projects—from repaving City streets, to investing in energy efficiency and renewable energy, fighting crime, expanding recycled water infrastructure, providing affordable housing, and offering job training for youths and adults.

With the majority of Recovery Act funds having been allocated to states, local governments and other funding recipients, the current focus for federal funding agencies is to ensure timely implementation of the many projects and programs that are being funded by the Recovery Act. To date, the City has expended over \$50 million dollars on Recovery Act activities and created 870 jobs.

This information memorandum provides a comprehensive update on the continuing efforts by City staff to implement projects and programs funded by the Recovery Act, while also meeting the ongoing reporting requirements set forth by the federal government. The City's Recovery Act Coordination Team, which is comprised of program leads from different City departments and the City Auditor's Office, continues to work collaboratively to ensure proper funding and implementation coordination between City departments, as well as compliance with Recovery Act requirements.

# **QUARTERLY REPORTING**

We are pleased to inform the Council that the City successfully met the sixth reporting deadline mandated by the Recovery Act. As the Council is aware, recipients of Recovery Act funds are required to report quarterly on the use of Recovery Act funds, and provide detailed information on



funds received and expended, projects status and activities, and number of jobs created (based on the OMB calculation methodology).

Attachment A reflects activity information reported to Federal, State and County agencies for the reporting quarter ending December 31<sup>st</sup>. Exhibit 1 reflects activity reported through the Federal web-based reporting system, FederalReporting.gov, for active Recovery Act projects in which the City receives funds directly from federal funding agencies, while Exhibit 2 reflects activity reported for active Recovery Act projects in which funds are passed through the State of California or Santa Clara County. For these programs, the City does not report expenditures or project data directly to FederalReporting.gov, but instead, complies with State or County reporting requirements.

As highlighted in our previous Recovery Act update reports, City staff has hosted meetings with representatives from a variety of federal, state and local agencies to review implementation of Recovery Act programs in San José. Funding agencies will likely continue to focus their attention on ensuring that recipients are moving forward expeditiously with implementing Recovery Act projects and, as such, may schedule additional meetings with recipients such as San José in the near future. We will continue to keep the Council apprised of upcoming audit visits that review Recovery Act implementation in San José.

# **PROGRAM UPDATES**

The following are brief highlights of key accomplishments and recent activities in each of the City Recovery Act Program Areas. Attachment B provides a comprehensive list of City of San José projects that have been approved to receive Recovery Act funds.

**Aviation (Estimated Recovery Act Funds - \$26.1 million):** Funds are being used to implement passenger safety improvements at Mineta San José International Airport, from taxiway improvements to the installation of state-of-the-art baggage screening equipment.

Key Accomplishments:

- Completed construction on two airport taxiway extensions that provide an alternative route for arriving and departing flight traffic.
- Completed installation of state-of-the-art baggage explosive detection systems for the Airport's new Terminal B.

## **Recent Activities:**

Staff have been working closely with the Federal Aviation Administration and Transportation Security Administration to begin project close-out and financial reconciliation for both projects.

**Economic/Workforce (Estimated Recovery Act Funds - \$16.1 million):** Funds are being used by work2future to provide a variety of support services, including occupational skills training, job readiness workshops, as well as placement and counseling services to adult and dislocated workers. In addition, Recovery Act funds helped to support summer work experience programs for eligible youth clients.

# Key Accomplishments:

- Completed two Summer Youth Employment Programs in 2009 and 2010, which enabled over 1,000 low-income youth participants between the ages of 15 and 24 to earn \$3.6 million in wages.
- Enrolled approximately 10,000 Adult and Dislocated Worker clients during fiscal year 2009-2010.
- Partnered with the Santa Clara County Social Services Agency to provide a work experience program for youth between the ages of 15 and 17 last summer.
- Implemented a Green Cadre program in 2010, which provided low income youth between the ages of 18 and 24 with industry-recognized certifications and internships in the clean energy and green sectors.

# Recent Activities:

Work2future has been utilizing Rapid Response funds to outreach to various employers that are planning employee layoffs, as well as conduct informational workshops to workers who may be subject to layoff. These workshops have been focused on informing workers of the many services that are available to them through work2future. Funds have also been used to support studies focused on regional and targeted job growth and best Rapid Response practices learned from other Rapid Response providers regarding proactive engagement with businesses, effective marketing of services, performance measurement, customer feedback and the importance of small business and entrepreneurship to improve the local and regional economy.

A second round of Green Cadre training began in January, with the goal of preparing youth participants for green sector jobs. Through their participation in the program, youth participants have also developed a network of supportive adult mentors that provide them greater access to other potential job opportunities.

**Energy (Estimated Recovery Act Funds - \$11.2 million):** Funds are being used to support a variety of municipal and community energy efficiency improvements and renewable energy projects, replacement of Low Pressure Sodium streetlights with programmable LED lights and development of a local energy assurance plan for all City facilities. These projects help to advance multiple Green Vision goals and further the City's efforts to thrive as an environmentally sustainable city.

# Key Accomplishments:

- Commenced with installation of energy efficient LED interior lighting, Energy Management Systems (EMS) controls and HVAC mechanical equipment at City facilities.
- Released Request for Proposals for solar production systems on municipal facilities and the replacement of 1,500 Low Pressure Sodium streetlights with programmable LED streetlights equipped with advanced energy efficient controls and communications.
- Completed construction of the Green Vision Clean Energy Showcase on the Redevelopment Agency-owned property across the street from City Hall was completed in December.
- Completed preliminary identification of critical City facilities and developed preliminary draft of a Critical Facilities Database.

## Recent Activities:

Two Requests for Proposals for solar on City facilities were released in Fall 2010. Proposals for a 1-MW ground-mounted solar system at the Water Pollution Control Plant are currently being reviewed by staff while proposals for solar production systems on 38 municipal sites, including community centers, libraries, parks, offices and service yards, are expected in March/April. In addition, an RFP was released for the replacement of approximately 1,500 Low Pressure Sodium streetlights with programmable LED streetlights equipped with advanced controls and communications to maximize energy efficiency and savings. Consultant selection recommendations for all three RFPs will be presented to Council later this spring.

On December 8, there was an unveiling of the Green Vision Clean Energy Showcase. The Showcase serves as a hub for disseminating information on solar and other energy efficient and renewable technologies. Tours of the Showcase are available for schools, professional organizations, and the general public to view the demonstrations and receive information on innovative financing options. The Showcase is expected to be open for one year.

*Housing (Estimated Recovery Act Funds - \$31.8 million):* Funds are being used to provide a variety of homelessness prevention, neighborhood stabilization, and training support services to the community. In addition, Recovery Act funds are allowing for the implementation of two infrastructure improvement projects.

Key Accomplishments:

- Partnering with three nonprofit agencies, the City continues to provide the community with critical homeless prevention and rapid re-housing assistance services, such as short term and medium term financial assistance and case management. During the most recent calendar quarter (ending December 31<sup>st</sup>), approximately 509 individuals and 186 households received financial assistance, while 476 individuals and 178 households received housing relocation and stabilization services through the Homeless Prevention and Rapid-Rehousing Program.
- Partnered with the Housing Trust of Santa Clara County and the Neighborhood Housing Services Silicon Valley to form the San José Neighborhood Stabilization Program 2 (NSP2) Consortium, with the goal of reducing the number of foreclosed and abandoned residential properties and stabilizing surrounding neighborhoods
- Conducted outreach and marketing activities, such as informational workshops, homebuyer education classes and print/internet ads, to increase the public's awareness of the assistance services that are available through NSP2.
- Completed construction activities on two storm drain infrastructure improvement projects in North San José.
- Partnered with two nonprofit agencies to provide job-readiness training to help homeless individuals become self-sufficient, gainfully employed and ultimately stabilized in permanent housing. Since the program launched its services last August, 87 participants have entered into job readiness programs at the two homeless one-stop centers.

# **Recent Activities:**

In December, the San José NSP2 Consortium entered into agreements with two development entities for its Single Family Acquisition-Rehab-Resale Program. Both developers have identified eligible properties within the targeted census tracts and are underway with acquisition and rehab activities. In addition, the Consortium funded four homeowner loans for low income homebuyers as part of its Purchase Assistance Loan program during the quarter ending December 31<sup>st</sup>.

Staff released an RFP for the replacement of approximately 150 Low Pressure Sodium streetlights with programmable LED streetlights equipped with advanced controls and communications to maximize energy efficiency and savings. Consultant selection recommendation will be presented to Council later this spring.

**<u>Public Safety (Estimated Recovery Act Funds - \$2.7 million)</u>:** Funds are being used to support the City's participation in several regional public safety programs, as well as assist the Police Department in its efforts to equip police officers with electronic report writing and data query capabilities.

# Key Accomplishments:

- Awarded a contract for the implementation of the Automated Field Reporting and Records Management System (AFR/RMS), Phase I project.
- Entered into contract with a non-government organization in support of the Anti-Human Trafficking Task Force in San José.

# **Recent Activities:**

The City recently completed an extensive RFP process for a contractor to implement the Automated Field Reporting and Records Management System (AFR/RMS). On March 1<sup>st</sup>, Council approved the use of \$1.35 million in Recovery Act funds to support the implementation of the Phase 1 project. This project will allow the Police Department to expedite and enhance the processing of crime reports, allow for real-time analysis of crime trends, and support a more efficient and proactive response to crime problems and effective deployment of limited staff resources by enabling police officers to enter information collected in the field directly into a database.

Using Recovery Act funds to support the City's participation in the Anti-Drug Abuse Enforcement Team, the Police Department's Narcotics Covert Investigations Unit has initiated two investigations that will span between three to six months.

<u>Transportation (Estimated Recovery Act Funds - \$15.4 million)</u>: Funds are being utilized to resurface many of the worst arterial street segments throughout the City, thereby helping the City address its backlog of deferred maintenance.

# Key Accomplishments:

• Completed construction activities on two street resurfacing projects that resurfaced a combined 25 miles of arterial street segments throughout the City. Information on the street segments that have been resurfaced using Recovery Act funds is available in Attachment B.

## Recent Activities:

Staff have been working closely with the State Department of Transportation to begin project closeout and financial reconciliation for both street resurfacing projects.

<u>Water (Estimated Recovery Act Funds - \$6.5 million):</u> Funds are being used to help implement eight water recycling projects as part of the South Bay Water Recycling (SBWR) Phase 1C Improvements. These improvements will add approximately nine miles to the SBWR distribution system and further advance the City's efforts to attain our Green Vision goal of recycling or beneficially reusing 100 percent of our wastewater.

# Key Accomplishments:

• Completed construction activities on three projects included in the Phase 1C Improvements.

## **Recent Activities:**

Construction activities are continuing on the remaining Phase 1C projects, with completion expected by later this year.
