INFORMATION

The City of San José is increasing efforts to reduce illegal fireworks use in the community through public education, higher fines, and enforcement. Our objective is to promote fireworks awareness about safety dangers while encouraging residents to enjoy a sense of community by attending one of the three local professional fireworks shows this Fourth of July.

In April the City Council approved higher fines, along with a pilot program that will beef up fireworks enforcement efforts in neighborhoods and parks. Council also directed that staff develop a public education program. The fines for fireworks-related violations are now \$500 for a first violation, \$700 for a second violation, and \$1,000 for a third violation. Code enforcement officers, park rangers, and some fire officials can issue these administrative fines to anyone who sells, uses, possesses or stores illegal fireworks.

The pilot will take place from Friday, July 1, through Tuesday, July 5, when illegal fireworks activity typically increases over the holiday weekend. The San José Police Department will focus available resources on targeted enforcement to address the blatant use of large-scale illegal fireworks shows at schools and parks. Police will utilize data analytics through its Crime Analysis Unit to capture and identify reported fireworks-related activity citywide. Dependent on available staffing, Police will look to assign designated fireworks patrols in uniform and plainclothes to advance enforcement in the community. During the pilot period, residents will also be able to report illegal fireworks and submit videos or photos through an online reporting tool that will be available on the City website.

In addition, to help promote a safe Fourth of July, the City is stepping up efforts to increase public awareness that fireworks, including so-called "safe and sane" fireworks, are both dangerous and illegal in San José and greater Santa Clara County. A comprehensive public education campaign in multiple languages (English, Spanish, and Vietnamese) is now underway.

The San José Fire Department also is collaborating with Santa Clara County Fire Department to further educate the broader community about fireworks being banned in most parts of the county including San José.

The San José campaign includes the following communications channels:

- Advertising Media. Advertising and public service time and space have been purchased or contributed for illegal fireworks messages in a variety of media during the weeks prior to the Fourth of July holiday weekend. These include:
