#### **ABOUT THE PROJECT**

Civic Stage Set by artist David Bottini is the brightly colored abstract geometric sculpture located in the lawn area Children's Discovery Museum. The sculpture successfully uses the juxtaposition of its energetic, decisive colors (chrome yellow, bold red, aquamarine and crisp white) and elegant, minimal forms to enchant the viewer. When creating Civic Stage Set, Bottini was inspired by the classic stage spaces that he came across while spending time in Italy. He became fascinated by the notion of contradiction when conceptualizing this piece – bringing together the essence of what is actually temporary and illusionistic as stage settings and something so permanent as steel.

Bottini often refers to his abstract works as "steel collages."

Influenced by the art of Cubism, Russian Constructivism and Minimalism, his work continuously explores spatial relationships and forms, "taking recognizable shapes, abstracting them and putting them together in a strange way of some sort."

#### **ABOUT THE ARTIST**

David Bottini is a well-established sculptor based in the Bay Area who shares his time between Oakland and Fresno. He completed a number of large, commissioned works and collaborated in several



architectural projects, including the International Terminal at the San Francisco Airport. Bottini, a graduate of San Jose State University in 1970 with a Master of Art Degree, is among the first rank of artists who continues the cubist constructivist tradition of 20th century sculpture. In addition to his artistic career, Bottini has dedicated many years to teaching sculpture at several universities, including San Francisco State University; Fresno State University; University of California, Berkeley; Reed College in Portland, Oregon and others.
