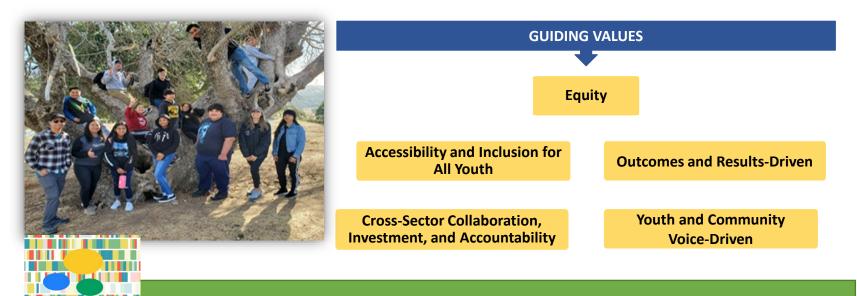


VISION

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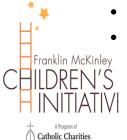

2023-2024 Operating Budget Overview

- 5 Divisions
- Operating Budget: \$167.7 million
- FTE: 854 FTE (615 FT/PT + 239 Seasonal)
- Program Revenue Target: \$18.6 million

2022-2023 City Services Report Data (Rounded):

202 Neighborhood Parks; 10 Regional Parks; 3 Golf Courses; 3,600 Acres of Developed & Open Space; \$15,262/Acre (Cost of Maintenance); 65 Miles of Trails; 17 Community Centers; 29 Neighborhood Center Partner Program Sites; 725,000 Program Registrants; \$17.7m Generated Revenue; \$3.8m Scholarships; 5,300 Scholarship Recipients; 26k Graffiti Removal Orders; 3,500 Tons of Illegal Dumping Disposal; etc...



2023-2024 Operating Budget Overview

City Manager's Budget Development Directives

- Focus: Council Approved Focus Areas & CSA Priorities
- Prioritize onetime-funded items with ongoing needs
- Reallocate existing funding to address higher priorities
- Identify offsets (new revenues / program reductions)
- Prioritize adds that foster equity/access
- Limit ongoing adds (imminent needs only)
- Keep onetime requests to onetime needs
