- Multi-Cultural Context





- 7 Fatalities along King Road over last 5 years:





- Proximity to Berryessa/North San José BART Station




















"We need shelters at bus stops for when it is raining" "Transit stops feel unsafe"

"Bikes have to wait for a long time at intersections"


"Bike lanes conflict with drivers and the bus lane"

Walking Facilities - Crosswalks


- All major intersections have crosswalks; not always on all four sides
- Crosswalk spacing varies 250 feet to 2100 feet; Average spacing 960 feet
- Crosswalk treatment varies; high-visibility striping for crosswalks




