Appendix C: Online Surveys Summary



Two online surveys were conducted to gather broader community input, supplementing the insights provided during the community workshops. In addition, the surveys provided an alternative opportunity to those who were unable to participate virtually or in-person in real time.

Survey questions and content closely mirrored the facilitated activities from both Community Workshop 1 and Community Workshop 2. This ensured that the insights from both engagement formats could be similarly considered in the development of the Draft Guiding Principles.

In Survey 1, respondents identified their top priorities for potential future development, expressed their greatest concerns, and identified the community amenities they would most like to see in and around PHGC. Questions in Survey 1 also addressed traffic and transportation and environmental sustainability, features, and practices. In Survey 2, labeled site features, programs, and amenities across five categories (Housing Types, Nonresidential Uses, Open Space and Community Amenities, Sustainability Features and Community Programs, and Urban Design and Transportation Features) as "Prioritize", "Okay to Include", "Exclude", or "No Opinion". Survey 2 also posed questions about housing tenure, affordable housing, and parking.

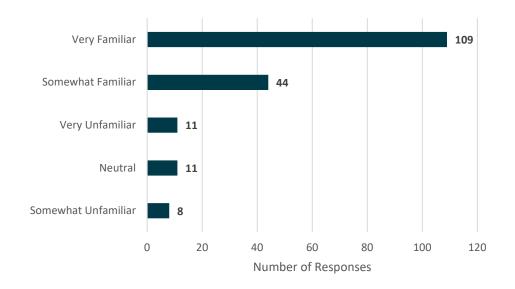
All questions on both surveys included write-in options where respondents could submit answers that were not covered by provided multiple choice options. Both surveys included optional demographic questions about race, age, and household income.

The online surveys, which were both hosted on ArcGIS's Survey123, opened after the conclusion of each workshop. Survey 1, which received 183 responses, was open from February 14, 2024 until April 15, 2024. Survey 2, which received 156 responses, was open from April 25 2024 until May 21, 2024.

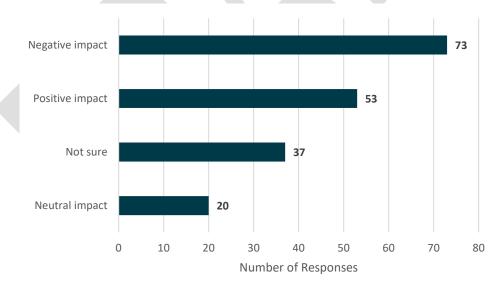

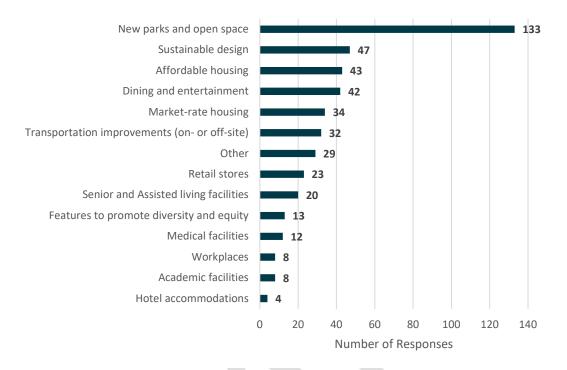
1. In your own estimation, how familiar are you with the Pleasant Hills Golf Course site?

9. How satisfied are you with the current community engagement process regarding PHGC development?

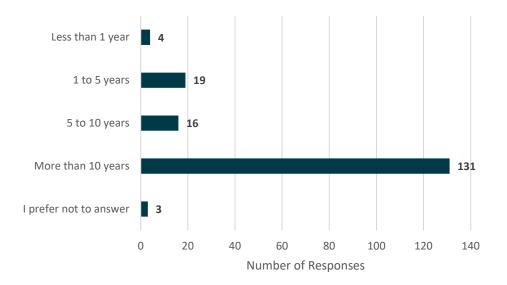


10. Which of the following best describes you?

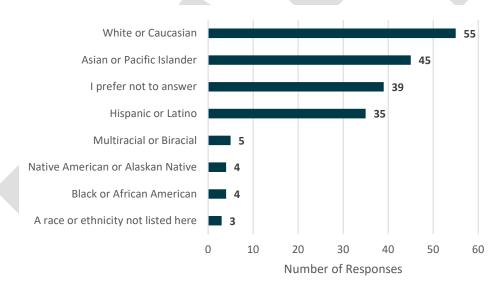




11. How long have you been a resident there?

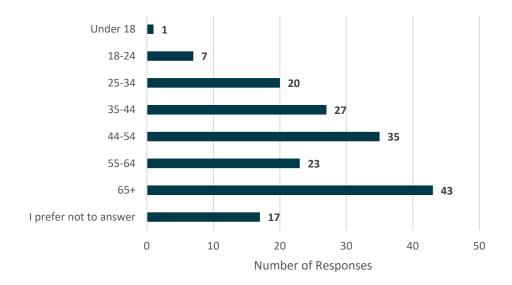


12. Which of the following best describes you?

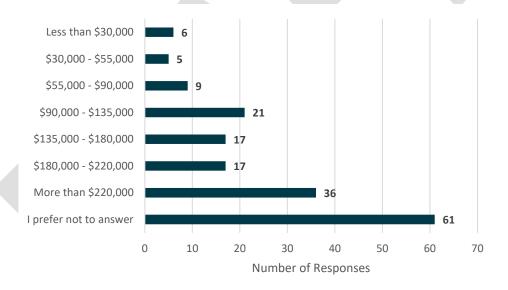




13. What is your age?

 up onto Capitol Expwy and multiple cars running the red light to not get stuck for
 another cycle. Ocala has a middle school, high school and elementary school which is
 a war zone during drops off/pickup times a rushed driver recently killed pedestrians



at Ocala middle school.

The existing road infrastructure CANNOT support additional high density housing. "Programs to encourage" people to use alternatives to driving are rarely impactful. This must be addressed before the project is allowed to move forward.

- We have a lack of parks in the area, PHGC would be a great addition to Cumminghan Park especially with the mature trees.
 If the development is approved, all the healthy mature trees should be saved on the property
- I think this process of involving the community to speak on the use of the land for pleasant hills golf course is not operating well. My family is Hispanic so I had trouble answering the race question above... also, no one knows about when the meetings are and I think that is wrong. also, ymca seems incorrect to have meeting at... it is too small in my view and too, many people do not know and are not informed of this process. some people of lower income may not even go and so this process is flawed. I think the idea I presented (and I presented it at microphone at intro meeting) is very wonderful... it lets police have a station which will be embraced for safety, I suggest you get ymca leader involved from their main office in downtown san jose and ask if they might consider moving the ymca and letting police have that site if city pitched in, let the Mayor know and his staff, and too, the city of morgan hill has a very cool aquatics center and would be good
- Please ensure there is lots of low income- extremely low income units. The higher density the better, but find examples of high density that still have welcoming community spaces and green spaces.
- If affordable homes are built, a priority should be set for our community helpers like teachers, nurses, police officers, etc. and our veterans.

Or building a Senior assisted living facility if the need is there.

Homes should not exceed the need for open space.

We need more fields so that our children can play soccer and not have to travel to other cities. Possibly a bike pump track made out of dirt to keep them outdoors and in a safe environment. Or a similar playground that enriches their minds.

Building habitats for nature with native plants and nesting boxes. A diversity of native plants that host caterpillars and produce nectar for a wide range of wildlife.

A tree canopy that provides shade, shelter and food.

Native oaks, native holly leaf cherry, native maples and native willows host a large number of butterfly caterpillars that in turn are also needed by our birds to sustain themselves and their nestlings.

Seeking help from conservation groups is a good idea as well.

• It would be wonderful if you could build a nice townhome/condo community, where young adults and medium income folks could sensibly purchase a home. Use a lottery system and make it income eligible. Your research should indicate that if you sell homes at market, you will not get a diverse community. That is harmful and the focus should be on first-time home buyers who can infuse a sense of pride of ownership and a sense of belonging. Please do what's right and what's best for all. Even better a



- rental complex with nice amenities would be the best so that you get a continuous mix of individuals. A loft environment with social venues for all to gather. Kind of like Evergreen Square.
- Many of the options listed should be implemented as standard practice.
 - Safety, transportation, and parks should be a do list not a wish list.
- Please keep open spaces and nature unrouched within our communities. Something similar to Emma Prusch park would be great for children and adults in the area.
- The traffic in our community is already congested, and adding additional houses would make it very difficult to get around in our community.
- Keep the wildlife in that golf course PRIORITY! Very furious and disappointed that sooo many trees were hacked down. Many lives were lost and disturbed and they were there first. Shame on you.....
- My big concern is traffic there is only 2main connection from white rd. to capital Ex. traffic backs up in front of my house Monday through Friday
- Unless and until the highway exchanges become more efficient the citizens in this area will increase gas house emission substantially because waiting to access highways can take 30 to 40 minutes between lights and waiting in line. I worked downtown San Jose for 37 years, retired in 2007. It often took me 45 minutes to travel those 13 miles and it is worse now! It can take 30 minutes to get to 580 going north or to 280 and then another 30 minutes to get to the Meridian exit! The impact of more people in area like Evergreen where they are still building denser population can only adversely effect the environment and the health of the population, increase water usage in draughts, and hamper any rail/transportation development.
- Not at this time.
- I'm looking forward to attending the next F2F community outreach meeting and refining the basic principles regarding the PHGC development.
- The traffic in this part of San Jose is already so congested; building up to 4,000 units of housing on this location would be wildly irresponsible, and drastically lower the quality of life for everyone already living in east San Jose. The water district is already lowering the amount of water we can use, and planning to fine anyone who exceeds new limits, and we have rolling blackouts during the hottest parts of the summer. There is not enough water and power resources to supply existing housing. If the State requires San Jose to build more housing, it should be built in the form of high-density developments right next to Caltrain, freeways, and BART stations. Very few residents will be able to realistically take light rail to work, and thousands of new residents would be clogging Capitol Expressway, Tully, White, etc. in their cars during morning and evening commutes.

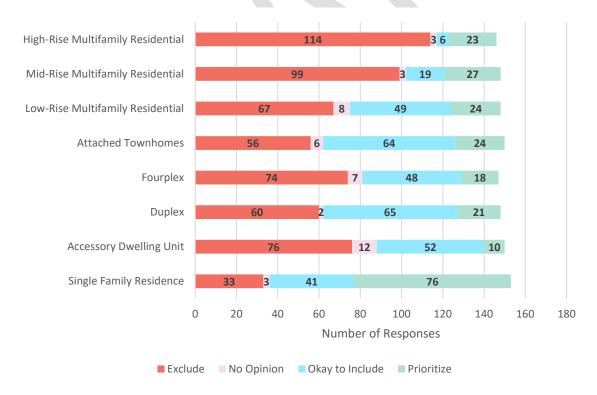

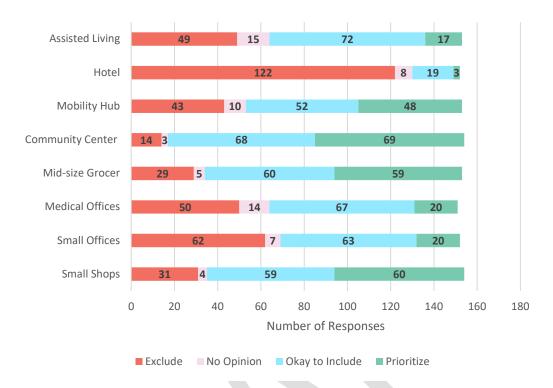

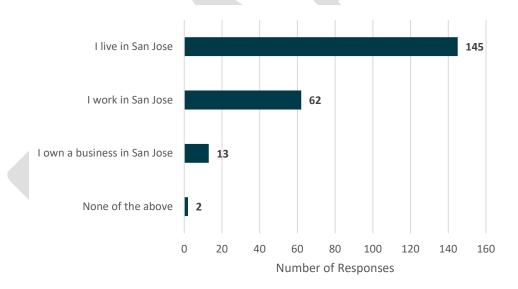




10. How satisfied are you with the current community engagement process regarding PHGC development?

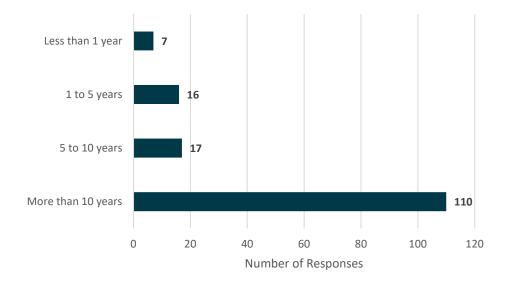


11. Which of the following describes you?

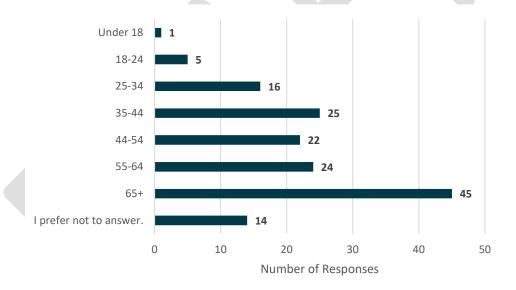




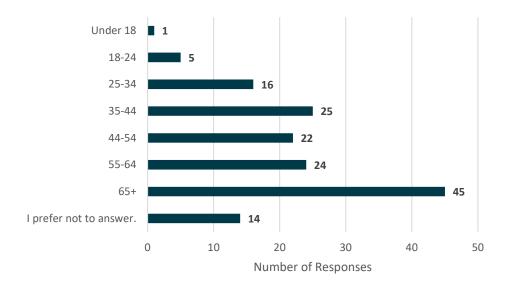

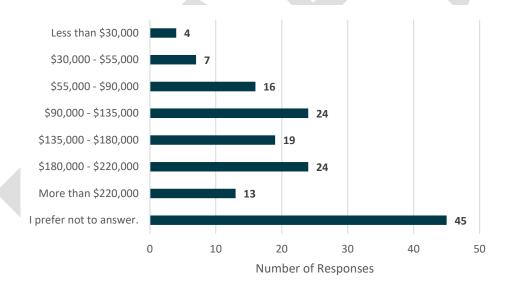
13. Which of the following best describes you?
