Chair Smith gave a briefing of issues 1, 2, 3 and 4B in the John Daley v. Jimmy Nguyen Complaint (Complaint 1) as well as the Dennis Hawkins v. Crema Coffee Company, et al. Complaint (Complaint 2). Investigators/Evaluators Joan Cassman and Steven Miller summarized the Independent Evaluator's Report and Recommendations for issues 1, 2, 3 and 4B in Complaint 1 and the Independent Evaluator's Report and Recommendations for Complaint 2. After being sworn in by Chair Michael Smith, testimony was presented by Richard Robinson, Attorney for Respondent Jimmy Nguyen. (See transcript for complete testimony.)

The Commission deliberated.

<u>Action</u>: Upon a motion by Commissioner Rolanda Pierre-Dixon, seconded by Vice-Chair Erica Cosgrove, the Commission moved to dismiss issues 1, 2, 3 and 4B in the John Daley v. 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
