Dear Neighbor,

Please join me from September 15th to October 15th in celebrating Hispanic Heritage Month!

Hispanic Heritage Month is an important time in the United States, when people recognize the contributions of Hispanic Americans to the U.S and celebrate the group's heritage and culture. Septembe 15th was chosen as the starting point for the celebration because it is the anniversary of independence of five Latin American countries: Costa Rica, El Salvador, Guatemala, Honduras, and Nicaragua. In addition, Mexico, Chile, and Belize celebrate their independence days on September

16th, September 18th, and September 21st, respectively.

Hispanic Heritage Month also celebrates the long and important presence of Hispanic and Latino Americans in North America. Hispanics have had a profound and positive influence on our country through their strong commitment to family, faith, hard work, and service. We celebrate notable Hispanic leaders and role models such as: Carlos Juan Finlay, a 20th century Cuban scientist and pioneer researcher in yellow fever; Mario Molina, born in Mexico and awarded the Nobel Prize in Chemistry in 1995; Carlos Slim, nicknamed the "Warren Buffett of Mexico" and a business magnate and philanthropist; Diego Armando Maradona Franco, the Argentinian soccer star; U.S. Supreme Court Justice Sonia Sotomayor; and our very own International Playwright Luis Valdez. They, along with countless others, such as Jaime Escalante, Octavio Paz, Carlos Fuentes, and Jose Orozco have enhanced and shaped our national character with centuries-old traditions that reflect

the multi-ethnic and multicultural customs of their community. For these reasons, I am prouto represent the City of San José's largest Hispanic district within our City.

MEXICAN INDEPENDENCE DAY

On September 16th we raised the Mexican Flag at City Hall. The Mexican Flag Raising Ceremony was a beautiful event with great speakers, art, music, and food.

We were happy to see a large turnout with myself, Councilmember Peralez, and Vice-Mayo Herrera giving the historical context of Mexican Independence Day. The Mexican Consul General Carlos Ponce gave a speech about the connections of San José and Mexico. The Overfelt High School JROTC Color Guard first raised the American Flag while we listened to the U.S. National Anthem sung by Darcie Green then the Mexican flag was raised with Mariachi Azteca playing the Mexican National Anthem. A reception was held after with food catered by Mezcal Restaurant.

September 16 is the anniversary of *El Grito de Dolores*, when Father Miguel Hidalgo made speech calling his parishioners to join him in taking up arms against the tyranny of Spanish rule. This call to action was also a demand for humane treatment, economic parity, self-reliance, and social justice. While we only officially celebrate this independence day once a year, we should remember to honor the commitment and sacrifices of *el pueblo*, the people through our daily actions as we seek social justice for our families, our communities, and ou children and greater economic prosperity for all our residents, foreign and U.S.-born. Let us always remember those who came before us and who lead the way so courageously.







Update on VTA's Santa Clara Alum Rock Bus Rapid Transit Project

I'm happy to be sharing some positive news with the community regarding VTA's Santa Clara-Alum Rock Bus Rapid Transit (BRT) Project.

VTA recently announced that it is restructuring the delivery of the project along Santa Clara Avenue, Alum Rock Ave., Capitol Avenue, and Capitol Expressway in San José. The complexity and unknown conditions in this area raised safety concerns which ultimately led VTA to halt all construction activities in the field in July.

VTA and its general contractor, Goodfellow Top Grade Construction (GTGC), have agreed that it is in the best interests of the project and of the public's safety for VTA to explore

alternative delivery methods for bringing BRT to this corridor.

As part of the restructuring, VTA and GTGC have entered into an agreement that allows VTA to continue work on key portions of the project while also repackaging the remaining work for a new bid process. VTA believes that this restructuring will ultimately provide the best results for all of our stakeholders.

VTA plans to install the station shelters near the SAP Arena, on Santa Clara Street near 17th Street and 24th Street, and along Capitol Expressway at Alum Rock Avenue, Story Road, and Ocala Road later this fall and early winter.

In Spring 2016, VTA plans to begin work on two other construction contracts for the downtown BRT stops and the Alum Rock Avenue bus lanes and roadway reconstruction after completion of the bid processes. VTA anticipates the work to be completed by early 2017.

Citizens and businesses along Alum Rock Avenue and Santa Clara Street are invited to a VTA public meeting to receive more information and to answer questions. The meeting is of Thursday, September 24th between 6 -7:30 p.m. (formal presentation begins at 6:30 p.m.)

I would like to thank the community for their patience with the project delays due to the safety shutdown. I am pleased that VTA found a way to continue this important project while preserving community safety as it's number one priority.




East San José Families at Yosemite Family Camp

The trip served as a much needed break to all of the hard working San José families. It was also a great chance to reconnect with nature in a world that feels dominated by social media and video games. In all, parents were able to take a break from the pressures of work, while the kids were able to remember that all they need to have fun is one another.







Successful Capitol/Goss Beautification Day

Last month, my office hosted a Dumpster Day for the Capitol/Goss Neighborhood Association. Residents began cleaning the neighborhood very early in the morning and had nearly 50 volunteers loading the bins and picking up litter! Latinos United for a New America (LUNA), East San Jose/Evergreen Rotary volunteers, and neighbors from other communities also helped beautify this active neighborhood.

The volunteers were able to haul away over six dumpsters of couches, mattresses, and other illegally dumped debris. These extra dumpster days would not have been possible if it were not for the leadershi of my City Council colleagues. I was able to secure funding for these types of events by encouraging my fellow City Council colleagues that we are in dire need of additional beautification resources in East Sai José and throughout the City.

Moratorium on Mobile Home Conversions

This month the City Council tackled Mobile Home Park conversions. With one mobile home park conversion pending and others possible, the Council placed a six-month hold on all conversions of mobile home parks. The hold was due in part to development agencies targeting mobile home parks as potential land for new developments. The mobile home park off Santa Row, Winchester Mobile Home Park, is the current project considered for conversion.



Because we recognize that mobile homes are some of the City's largest sources of affordable housing and can act as a stepping stone for new home owners, the Council decided to place a hold on all conversions to allow the City's Housing Department time to further investigate the ramifications, both to mobile home owners and mobile park land owners, of a conversion. The six-month timeline will allow more room for data gathering and conversations with the impacted parties while balancing the need to continue forward momentum for further development.

We will continue to fight for home owners' security and prosperity. Follow up information will be available as we move forward.

National Women's Equality Day

August 26th is National Women's Equality Day. This date marks the anniversary of women's suffrage with the passage of the 19th Amendment back in 1920. The importance of women being involved politically is more critical today than ever before. Currently there are only two women on the San José City Council, so we should continue to encourage women to get involved politically. There is a readanger that I may be the ONLY woman serving on the Council in one of the largest cities of the United States. It is incumbent upon us to encourage women to take on positions of influence and to get involved politically.

Women have a different, valuable perspective to bring to the political arena. We understand what it means to give up our careers and care for our children because of a lack of affordable childcare. We know what it feels like to stay in relationships that are dangerous to our safety because of fear, intimidation, and economic uncertainty. We live with an all too real understanding of what it means whe we cannot feed our children and have to depend on the generosity of a neighbor, on a free school lunch or on good policy that will support and potentially carve out a dignified life for our kids.

As we celebrate how far we have come, we must also realize that full equality for all women hasn't yet been realized. My daughters' futures hinges on our actions today. We must continue to create leadershill opportunities and develop good policies, advocate for our youth, and be bold enough to NOT wait to be invited to table but to take our rightful place.





Naturalization Ceremony at Avaya Stadium

On Saturday, September 12th the City of San José joined U.S. Citizenship and Immigration Services (USCIS), the San José Earthquakes, and Citi Community Development in hosting a naturalization ceremony at Avaya Stadium.

The 10 new U.S. citizens, who were sworn in at 6:15 PM, are two married couples from India, a family of four from the Philippines, and two individuals from Mexico.

This event kicks off San José's Cities for Citizenship Initiative, a major national initiative aimed at increasing citizenship among eligible U.S. permanent residents.

I am so proud to have been able to participate in such a great, celebratory event and to have been on hand when these 10 people officially became U.S. citizens!






Transportation Safety In Your Community

Based on crash data from 2010-2014, 14 major street segments have been identified as having the highest frequency of fatal and severe injury crashes for people walking, bicycling, motorcycle riding and driving.
