My office also recognized a long-time East San José family who have done so much to improve the lives, wellness, and happiness of countless families: the Guerreros. They have served the District 5 community since their time in college and well into their professional career. Martha Guerrero has worked at Mt. Pleasant High School for 29 years, first as a teacher and now as a principal. Jose Luis is a retired Battalion Chief for the San Jose Fire Department. Juan Carlos has earned an Emmy for his work as producer for Univision. Ignacio is the Director of the Department of Child Support Services for the County of Santa Clara. Veronica, who was unable to attend the ceremony, devotes countless volunteer hours at Our Lady of Peace. For these things and many more, it was my pleasure to recognize them as the District 5 Community Honorees.

The program continued with the Mayor's State of the City address. This year he focused on job creation and supporting our working families by expanding the [San Jose Works](#) program to employ 1,000 more teens and increasing the minimum wage in San José and across Santa Clara County. He also talked about our affordable housing crisis, and announced two projects that will retrofit empty hotels for interim homeless housing, plans to create a 150-unit "micro-village", and an initiative to house all our homeless veterans by Veteran's Day 2018. Other community resources we all can look forward to include: a community soccer center near Avaya Stadium; a softball complex in East San José; and high-speed Internet coming to neighborhoods that



On February 21st, we planted 500, much needed, bare root roses at Emma Prusch Park.

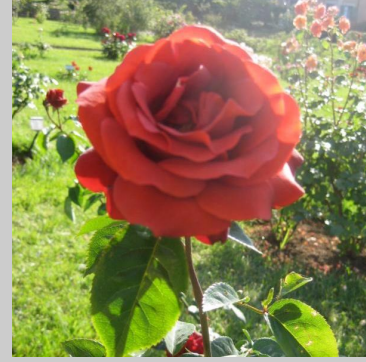
With the help of our incredible volunteers we were able to finish this extensive project in only 90 minutes.

New Chief Of Police Confirmed

Last week, my colleagues and I voted in our Interim Chief, Eddie Garcia, to be San José's permanent Police Chief.

We selected Chief Garcia for his numerous qualifications, Chief Garcia has spent his entire career with the San José Police Department (SJPD).

He has served at every rank within our SJPD, becoming an officer for the city back in February of 1992. He worked the Patrol Division and was selected to work in the Narcotics Enforcement Team.



After working in the Narcotics Enforcement Team, he was selected to work in Special Operations - M.E.R.G.E (Mobile Emergency Response Group and Equipment). Chief Garcia was promoted to Sergeant in August of 2000.

He worked patrol and then was selected to work as a Night Detective and later as a Homicide Investigator.

He was promoted to Lieutenant in December of 2005.

As a lieutenant, he commanded the Community Services Division and the Special Investigations Unit.

He was instrumental in creating the East San José Weed and Seed program, a program that partnered SJPD with various nonprofits like Fresh Life Lines for Youth/Boys and Girls Club in order provide opportunities to assist them in making positive healthy choices.

In all, Eddie Garcia has committed over two decades of his life to serving and protecting the residents of San José.

My colleagues and I are confident that Eddie Garcia will be able to lead our Police Department, to the title of "Safest Big City in America" like others before him.

Mobile Homes Protected

This past month the city discussed amending title 20 of the municipal code (promotes and protects the public peace, health, safety, and general welfare) to further protect residents of mobile home parks.

This is a very urgent issue due to the thousands of San José residents residing in mobile homes. Our current economic environment is pushing for a greater demand on affordable housing.



The additional amendments would include, relocation assistance, should a resident's mobile home park close or convert for another use. Council has directed city staff to clarify areas of mobile home protection. Additionally, Council is considering the "opt in" clause for mobile homes. In this scenario, park owners that adopt "opt in" programs could pass capital improvements costs to residents.

Council has committed to further investigate solutions, but in order for any policies to be implemented, the policies must be voted and passed by City Council.

Mobile homes serves as one of the many forms of affordable housing for San José residents. Taking note, Council will continue to carry out the work on this matter for all residents.

A Welcome to our New Independent Police Auditor

The new Independent Police Auditor for the City of San José is Walter Katz. Mr. Katz was appointed by the Mayor and City Council on November 3, 2015 and assumed his responsibilities on January 5, 2016.

Previously, Mr. Katz served as a Deputy Inspector General for the County of Los Angeles Office of Inspector General (OIG), which oversees the Los Angeles County Sheriff's Department.

In that role, he led the Inspector General's effort in monitoring the LASD's body-worn camera implementation program. Furthermore, Mr. Katz developed a framework for increased transparency by the LASD to disclose use of force and civilian complaint information to the public.



Prior to the OIG, he worked as a staff attorney at its predecessor agency, the Office of Independent Review, since 2010.

There he closely monitored and reviewed the LASD's investigations of deputy-involved shootings and disciplinary investigations. Mr. Katz has also advised other police agencies and municipalities in their reform efforts.

Mr. Katz is active in the National Association for Civilian Oversight of Law Enforcement (NACOLE), serves on the non-profit organization's Training, Education and Standards Committee and has frequently been a panelist or moderator on accountability and transparency issues at its annual conference.

He has written about police accountability in the Harvard Law Review Forum and The New York Times and has given his insights in The Atlantic, on public radio and other news outlets.

Prior to his work in civilian oversight of law enforcement, he served a deputy public defender in Southern California for seventeen years.

He received his law degree from the McGeorge School of Law at the University of the Pacific and his undergraduate degree from the University of Nevada, Reno.

Recycling Old Junk Easily and Free of Charge

San José residents can now recycle their unwanted junk more easily and cheaply, thanks to a new large-item collection program.

Residents follow only two easy steps:

- 1) Call their recycling hauler to schedule a pick-up appointment
- 2) Set their items on the curb for collection.

The first collection of up to three large items is free and includes furniture, mattresses, appliances, and tires. Each subsequent collection- up to three items- costs \$27.

Check out the findings in Food for Everyone to see what healthy food access resources for homeless individuals and families and low-income seniors look like in your community.

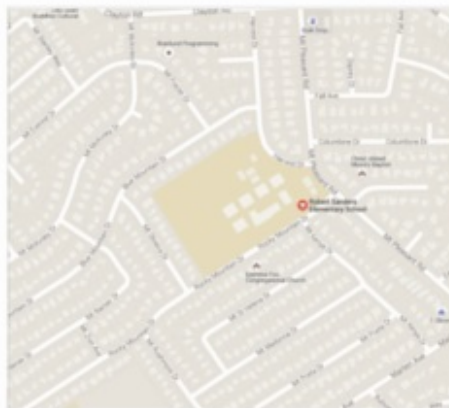

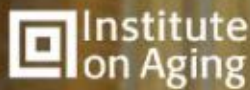

*If you do not qualify for the fee waiver, the USCIS fee is **\$680**, payable to "US Department of Homeland Security" via credit card, check or money order.
