Last night the City Council unanimously fast tracked my proposal to develop a Women's Bill of Rights ordinance also know as the Convention of All Forms of Discrimination Against Women (CEDAW) in the City of San Jose.

This ordinance would help ensure San Jose is gender equitable. That our hiring, our policies and programs reflect that goal. Research shows that inadvertent discrimination is common without proactive review of city activities. It is a process, a fairer way of operating, not a separate program. San Jose is a progressive city but discrimination is hidden and pervasive and without light we cannot end discriminatory practices.

In addition, the Council move forward my proposal to develop innovative strategies to hiring more crossing guards. Due to the nature of the job requirements for a crossing guard with limited hours, it has been difficult to retain and hire crossing guards for our schools. I hope that by working with parents we can develop a stronger program that could build capacity in the program and keep our children safer.

All-Inclusive Playground

On Tuesday, October 2nd, we kicked off the initiative for a brand new all-inclusive playground at Emma Prusch Park with the partnership of Magical Playground and the County of Santa Clara. Did you know that over 10,000 children in Santa Clara County have "major disabilities," and over 20,000 take advantage of special education in our schools. It is imperative that we serve all of our children. The City of San Jose is one of the few cities in Santa Clara County that has an all-inclusive playground park.

Hosted by the City of San José and Santa Clara Valley Water District, three upcoming Winter Storm Resource Fairs will discuss development of a Joint Emergency Action Plan that pertains to potential flooding on Coyote Creek and all San José waterways, and will help you prepare for the possibility of flooding.

The two agencies will discuss the improved process for notifying communities about a possible flood; where to get sandbags and how to use them; short-term projects that will reduce the risk of flooding on Coyote Creek, and more.

Attendees that sign up for ALERT SCC will receive a free emergency starter kit. Spanish and Vietnamese interpreters will translate presentations, and trilingual handout are available.

The fairs target the neighborhoods that were affected by the February 2017 Coyote Creek flood, but all San José residents are welcome to attend.



A Celebration of Life on the Day of the Dead, will be a two day spectacular celebration set to take place at the School of Arts and Culture at the Mexican Heritage Plaza on October 28 and 29, 2017. La Ultima Parada honors the Mexican tradition of the Day of the Dead through a collection of cultural festivities, dances, and musical performances.

To kick off the celebration on Saturday, the Alum Rock Altar Walk will feature altars and other art installations at 30 locations in the three business blocks surrounding the Mexican Heritage Plaza (MHP). Following the altar walk, the Cumbia Dance Party at the School of Arts and Culture at the Mexican Heritage Plaza will feature music groups, Lado Oriente and Pasto Seco.

On Sunday La Ultima Parada will feature a variety of activities to delight the entire family. Participants will be able to enjoy Loteria (bingo), arts and crafts, costume contest, face painting and a ferris wheel. LUP will have a Mercadito with over 2 dozen Dia de los Muertos themed retailers as well as a wide variety of delicious food and beverages.

The event will feature La Viejada, one of LUP's long standing traditions. La Viejada is a traditional dance originating in the state of Veracruz that honors those who have passed. This performance will feature over 300 masked danzantes from San Jose folklorico dance companies participate to honor our dearly departed.

This year, our main stage will feature grammy winning artists Quetzal, sharing the stage with Aloe Blacc and Maya Jupiter. LUP will count with two additional stages with a variety of presentations on Sunday, curated by San Jose's very own Sonido Clash.

Day of the Dead community altars will be on exhibit in the theater lobby remembering passed members of the community. The garden of the venue will be turned into a "camposanto" (graveyard) to pay tribute to iconic Latino artists and entertainers in recognition of their contributions to Latino culture by prominent San Jose artist, Raquel Burciaga. At night, the face of the MHC theater will come alive with a Day of the Dead themed projection display.
