ABOUT THE PROJECT

Anna Valentina Murch's Garden Park is situated in Edenvale Park next to the historic Hayes Mansion. Through public meetings, Murch discovered that the community wanted an artwork that was inspired by the vast history of the site. They asked for the piece to incorporate elements of the indigenous people of the valley, the agricultural era, Frontier Village - the 1960s era amusement park located on the site, the Hayes family orchards, and the garden of Mary Hayes. They also desired an artwork that revolved around a theme of transition, both physically and symbolically, to represent the transformation of the park through the master plan and the restoration of wildlife. Lastly, they hoped that Murch's artwork would be a place of contemplation and peace.

Murch's artwork features a stone circle in the middle of the garden covered in round holes, reminiscent of Native American pounding holes, which function as waterholes for wildlife. To the north of the stone circle is an oak grove, which also references indigenous people who were dependent upon acorns as a staple of their diet. Ornamental cherry trees are planted to the west and east of the circle in remembrance of the Hayes's orchard and the valley's agricultural past. A bridge leads away from the circle towards the mansion over a moat of wildflowers in honor of Frontier Village. Lavender is found on the far edge of the oak grove, creating a rich scent nostalgic of Mary Hayes' healing garden. This peaceful artwork provides an area for quiet meditation on the transition of the seasons and the transformation of the park's historic value.

Students from neighboring elementary, middle and high schools participated in the creation of the artwork and used it as a touchstone for a curriculum about the community. More information about the students' project may be found at www.lullah.com/gedc/edenvalegardens.html.
