


City of San José Budget Overview

2019-2020 PROPOSED CITY BUDGET¹: \$4.3 billion

TOTAL NUMBER OF FUNDS: 123

TOTAL NUMBER OF POSITIONS (FTE): 6,622



An adjustment of \$879 million is necessary to arrive at the \$4.3 billion net 2019-2020 Proposed City Budget to avoid the double-counting of transfers, loans, and contributions between City funds.



2019-2020 Proposed Budget Overview

- Balanced all funds (General Fund, special and capital funds)
- General Fund projected surplus of \$5.1 million
- Ongoing surplus of \$4.7 million, plus one-time funding of \$10.9 million set aside to cover the projected 2020-2021 shortfall
- Investment priorities:
 - ✓ Saving
 - √ Public Safety
 - ✓ Confronting the High Cost of Housing and Living
 - √ Homelessness
 - √ Combatting Blight
 - ✓ Environment
- Positions are up 3.3%, from 6,413 to 6,622




2019-2020 Proposed Budget

General Fund Sources






2019-2020 Proposed BudgetGeneral Fund Uses




