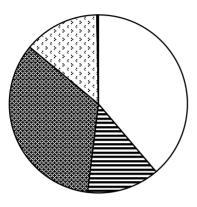
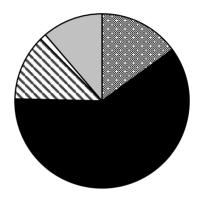

2018-2019 Adopted Source of Funds



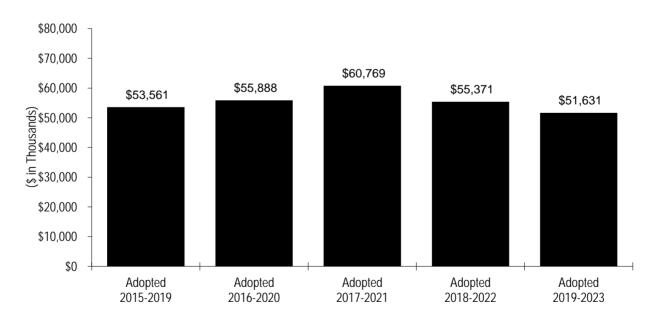

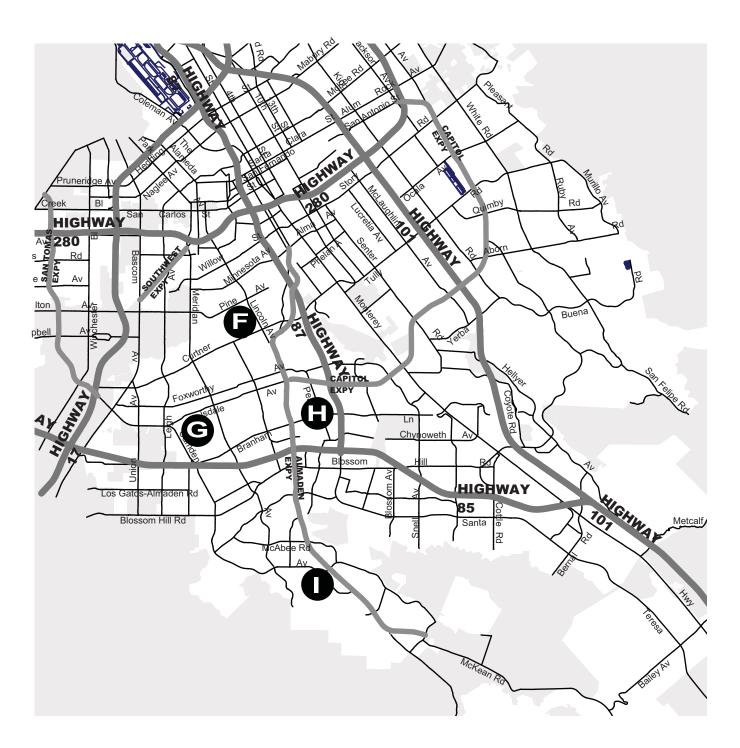

Overview

INTRODUCTION

The Public Safety Capital Program funds capital improvements for the Fire Department to effectively provide emergency services.

The 2019-2023 Adopted Public Safety Capital Improvement Program (CIP) totals \$51.6 million, of which \$24.3 million is budgeted in 2018-2019. This program is part of the Public Safety City Service Area and supports the following outcome: *The Public Feels Safe Anywhere, Anytime in San José*.

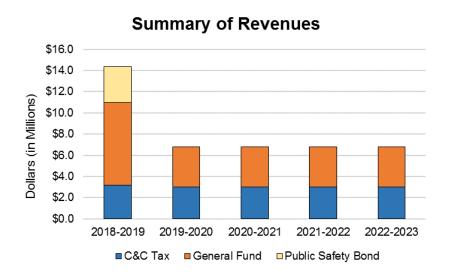
PROGRAM PRIORITIES AND OBJECTIVES

In alignment with the goals of the Envision San José 2040 General Plan, the objective of the Public Safety Capital Program is to provide, maintain, and improve facilities and equipment that support the delivery of effective emergency services to the City of San José residents and visitors. The priorities in the 2019-2023 Adopted CIP include:

- Investments in fire facilities that address infrastructure repairs and backlog issues and improve functionality;
- Investments in fire apparatus and equipment that ensure fire personnel are equipped to respond to emergencies in an effective and timely manner; and
- Investments in technology and new facilities that improve emergency response.

SOURCES OF FUNDING

Revenue for the Public Safety Capital Program in the 2019-2023 Adopted CIP is derived from three primary sources: contributions from the General Fund (\$23.3 million) primarily for fire apparatus replacements; the Fire Construction and Conveyance (C&C) Tax Fund (\$15.3 million); and the Neighborhood Security Bond Fund (\$3.3 million).

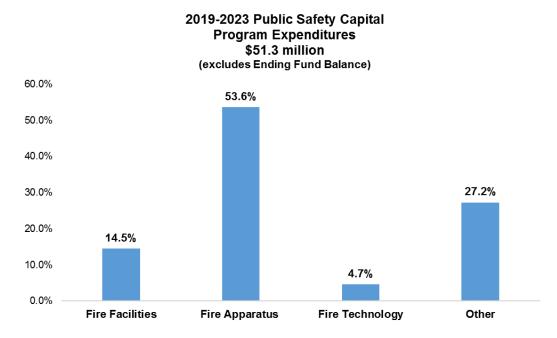
SOURCES OF FUNDING

The 2018-2019 Adopted Capital Budget estimate for C&C taxes is \$38.0 million, of which 8.4% (\$3.2 million) is allocated to the Public Safety Capital Program. Approximately 99% of the C&C tax is derived from a transfer tax imposed upon each transfer of real property, with the remaining 1% generated from a construction tax levied on most types of construction. The 2019-2023 CIP assumes 2017-2018 C&C revenues of \$42.0 million will fall short of the 2016-2017 receipts of \$43.3 million by approximately 3%, decrease again in 2018-2019 to \$38.0 million, and will remain flat at \$36.0 million for each year of the CIP. Over the five years of the CIP, collections allocated to the Public safety Capital Program will total \$15.3 million. For additional information regarding C&C Tax revenue, please refer to the Construction and Conveyance Tax section of the Summary of Capital Improvement Program Revenues, which is in the Summary Information (Section III) of this CIP.

The March 2002 Neighborhood Security Act Bond Measure authorized the City to issue General Obligation Bonds in an amount not to exceed \$159 million to fund capital projects in the Police and Fire Departments. The 2019-2023 CIP includes the remaining \$4.9 million from the Neighborhood Security Act Bond Measure (including the final issuance of \$3.3 million anticipated in 2018-2019) that will be spent to address needed capital repairs at fire stations. Assessments on the property taxes of San José residents are used to support these obligations.

Public Safety Bond Projects/Fire Facilities Remediation

Over the last decade, the major investment in Public Safety infrastructure was made possible because of Measure O, the "9-1-1, Fire, Police, Paramedic and Neighborhood Security Act." Approved by the voters in March 2002, this \$159 million general obligation bond program is substantially complete. Over the five-year CIP, the remaining Neighborhood Security Bond funds of \$4.9 million will address critical capital improvement projects at fire stations identified in life cycle and condition assessment reports conducted over the past several years. Rehabiliation and remediation work at Fire Station 22 is anticipated to be completed in summer 2018. Remediation work for remaining Fire Stations 3, 4, 9, 30, and 14 is programmed for 2018-2019 and 2019-2020.

Fire Station 37, which had been originally identified for construction as part of the Public Safety Bond Program, is on hold in accordance with previous City Council direction due to an approximately \$7.0 million shortfall to construct and outfit the station, and an ongoing funding need of \$3.7 million for personnel, operations, and maintenance costs. To allow for the timely expenditure of remaining bond proceeds, expenditures related to the rehabilitation and remediation of existing fire stations were reallocated to the Neighborhood Security Bond Fund in 2017-2018, while the Fire C&C Tax Fund preserves the existing Fire Station 37 funding of \$4.6 million in a reserve.

The 2018-2019 Mayor's March Budget Message directed the Administration to explore a potential bond measure to provide an infusion of new funding for rehabilitation of the City's public infrastructure assets. After a review of potential options, the City Council approved the placement of a \$650 million General Obligation Bond ballot measure for disaster preparedness, public safety, and infrastructure on the November 2019 ballot. Should this measure pass, the City Council has identified Fire Station 37 as one of the priority projects to receive funding.

Fire Apparatus Replacement

The City's long term investment in fire apparatus has significantly improved the reliability of the Fire Department's fleet and their ability to respond to emergencies in accordance with established response time performance measures. The replacement of fire engines, aerial ladder trucks, brush patrols, water tenders, and other emergency response apparatus is planned in accordance with the Fire Apparatus Replacement Policy. The 2019-2023 CIP includes \$27.5 million for fire apparatus replacement, of which \$10.9 million is budgeted in 2018-2019. This allocation is funded by annual contributions of \$3.8 million from the General Fund and \$400,000 from the Fire C&C Tax Fund, as well as the rebudget of \$4.0 million in the General Fund and \$2.7 million in the Fire C&C Tax Fund from 2017-2018 to 2018-2019.

Emergency Response Times

The 2019-2023 Adopted CIP will continue the Fire Station Alerting System project. This Internet Protocol (IP)-based alerting system with text-to-speech broadcasts is expected to reduce response times. The system allows the broadcast of an event to happen immediately upon the unit assignment with less than a one second delay because the vocal alarm uses an IP pathway that does not need to wait for the dispatch channel to be clear. This system has been effective in reducing call processing time, and consequently overall response time, by an average of approximately 30 seconds per call during the first year of implementation with other organizations of a similar size and call volume to those of the City of San José, compared to the current call processing time of 120 seconds. Following a system test at a select number of fire stations, installation of needed system hardware at each fire station, as well as redundant connectivity to ensure the reliability in the event of a primary connection outage, will be completed in the coming year, finalizing the implementation of the IP-based alerting system.

Work continues on the Emergency Vehicle Preemption Service at all signalized intersections to help improve response times to fire and medical emergencies. Integration with the Transportation Department's (DOT) traffic management controls system and the automated vehicle location features that exist in the Fire Department's Computer Aided Dispatch (CAD) System, combined with minor software upgrades, will allow the CAD system to communicate fire apparatus' location information to the traffic management control system. The system will then remotely activate emergency vehicle signal preemption service along a response route within a four-second or less resolution, compared to the current rate of 120 seconds. In June 2018, a pilot program was initiated to test the system at three fire stations (8, 18, and 26). In addition, 25 intersections will receive hardware updates to allow them to function with the new system. Following the pilot program and signal upgrades, the system will be rolled out to the remaining fire stations by October 2018, and ultimately to the Police Department as well.

<u>Facilities Improvements</u>

The 2019-2023 Adopted CIP includes \$2.3 million for much-needed improvements to aging fire stations, which reflects an additional \$408,000 above the 2018-2022 Adopted CIP. The additional funding will primarily address the removal of carpet at Fire Stations 9 and 14 as part of the priority to minimize carcinogenic exposure. The removal of carpet will allow routine wet-mop decontamination of living areas exposed to diesel fume and other particulates. The Fire Department will also continue to perform routine maintenance and repairs on fires stations as well as significant capital improvements on fire station assets nearing end-of-life.

Personal Protective Equipment

The 2019-2023 Adopted CIP includes \$1.75 million for the Personal Protective Equipment Program, which reflects an additional \$220,000 in 2018-2019 and \$200,000 annually for the purchase of turnout ensemble, moving the department closer to the 10-year replacement cycle recommended by the National Fire Protection Association (NFPA) and the Occupational Safety Health Administration (OSHA). OSHA is in the process of adopting a new PPE standard requiring replacement of turnout ensembles on a ten-year cycle. The initial estimate to fund the 10-year replacement cycle for Personal Protective Equipment is \$520,000 annually. The commitment is met for the first year with \$420,000 funded by the 2017-2018 Personal Protective Equipment appropriation and \$100,000 in the Fire Department's General Fund Non-Personal/Equipment appropriation. Additional funding will be needed in the remaining years of the CIP to meet this need. In addition, \$15,000 is being added on a one-time basis to establish a Personal Protective Equipment inventory system that will aid in ensuring equipment is accurately tracked, proactively maintained, and replaced when necessary.

MAJOR CHANGES FROM THE 2018-2022 ADOPTED CIP

The overall size of the Public Safety CIP has decreased by \$3.8 million from \$55.4 million in the 2018-2022 Adopted CIP to \$51.6 million in the 2019-2023 Adopted CIP, primarily resulting from a lower carry-over balance for Fire Apparatus Replacement.

OPERATING BUDGET IMPACT

The remaining Neighborhood Security Act Bond project, Fire Station 37, will have an estimated ongoing operating and maintenance costs of \$3.7 million annually once constructed. However, the Fire Station 37 project is on hold pending a funding strategy as directed by the Mayor's March Budget Message for Fiscal Year 2016-2017, as approved by the City Council, to completely fund the construction and ongoing operating and maintenance cost of Fire Station 37.

The new IP-based Fire Station Alert System will have approximately \$40,000 in ongoing operating costs associated with the required redundant connectivity, and \$68,000 in annual support and maintenance costs associated with the contract.

COUNCIL-APPROVED REVISIONS TO THE PROPOSED CAPITAL IMPROVEMENT PROGRAM

Changes to the Proposed Capital Improvement Program were brought forward in the Mayor's June Budget Message for Fiscal Year 2018-2019 and approved by the City Council on June 12, 2018. This included the rebudgeting of unexpended funding for projects totaling \$5.5 million as well as the addition of \$32,500 for Fire Facilities Improvements for Fire Stations 27 and 35.

- In the C&C Tax Fund, seven projects were rebudgeted totaling \$989,000: Fire Station Alert System (\$400,000), Alternative Public Safety Answering Point Equipment (\$162,000), Facilities Improvements (\$100,000), Fire Station 29 Generator (\$100,000), Fuel Tank Replacement (\$127,000), Traffic Control Equipment (\$72,000), and Telecommunication Equipment (\$28,000). Additionally, \$32,500 was added to Fire Facilities Improvements for Fire Stations 27 and 35 for ovens, recliners and a refrigerator.
- In the General fund, four projects were rebudgeted totaling \$4,515,000: Fire Apparatus Replacement (\$4.0 million), Emergency Vehicle Preemption Service (\$480,000), South San José Police Substation FF&E (\$29,000), and Portable Emergency Mass Warning System (\$6,000).

at Fire Stations 3, 4, 9, 30, and 13. Major improvements were completed at Fire Station 22, including abatement, roofing, kitchen remodel, and bathroom improvements during 2017-2018. Justification This allocation addresses critical capital repairs and maintenance needs at fire facilities and will increase the longevity

Notes In April 2013, life-cycle assessments for five Fire Stations (3, 4, 13, 16, and 30) provided estimates for the scope of

repair required for these facilities. Further assessments have identified Fire Stations 9, 18, and 23 as additional projects for remediation. Facility improvements at Fire Station 16 were completed in fall 2015. In 2016-2017, facility improvements at Fire Stations 18 and 23 were completed. In 2017-2018, facility improvements were completed at Fire

Station 22.

CIP is an allocation of \$420,000 in 2018-2019 and annual allocation of \$200,000 in the remaining years of the CIP for the implementation of a 10-year replacement cycle for Personal Protective Equipment (PPE). A total of \$520,000 annually is necessary to fund the PPE replacement. With a General Fund Operating commitment of \$100,000, this program is fully funded in 2018-2019, but there is an annual shortfall of \$220,000 in the remaining years of the CIP. The 2018-2019 allocation also includes \$15,000 to fund a software to monitor inventory within the company stores.

DescriptionThis reserve in the 2019-2023 CIP sets aside \$4.6 million in the Fire Construction and Conveyance (C&C) Tax Fund to

construct a new fire station on the Willow Glen Community Center's parking lot (Fire Station 37). This amount includes C&C funds previously allocated for Fire Facilities Remediation, a \$300,000 increase approved in the 2016-2017 Annual Report from available fund balance, and the Fire Station 37 Earmarked Reserve of \$960,000 funded by the local sales tax measure approved in June 2016. Initially Fire Station 37 was to be funded by Neighborhood Security Bond funds. Due to funding gaps that prevented Station 37 from moving forward, the 2018-2022 CIP reallocated the Neighborhood Security Bond funds to Fire Station Remediation projects that would otherwise be funded by Fire C&C Funds to ensure the timely expenditure of those Bond funds while Fire C&C funds were reallocated to the Fire Station 37 Reserve. Prior to the 2018-2022 CIP

changes, funding levels for the project totaled \$5.5 million.

As Fire C&C funding becomes available, the Fire Station 37 (Construction) Reserve will be prioritized, allocating funding to support the future construction needs. Remaining project costs are currently estimated at \$11.6 million, including construction (\$10.3 million); fixtures, furniture, and equipment (\$540,000); and a fire engine and related equipment (\$800,000). After the use of the \$4.6 million reserve, the Fire Station 37 project will have a minimum \$7.0 million capital funding gap. In addition, upon completion the fire station will require ongoing funding of approximately \$3.7 million annually for operating and maintenance. This project is deferred until full funding is identified and approved by the City Council.
