- *Neighborhood Services* Serve, foster, and strengthen community by providing access to lifelong learning and opportunities to enjoy life.
- *Transportation & Aviation Services* A safe and efficient transportation system that contributes to the livability and economic health of the City; and provide for the air transportation needs of the community and the region at levels that is acceptable to the community.
- *Environment and Utility Services* Manage environmental services and utility systems to ensure a sustainable environment for the community.
- *Public Safety Services* Commitment to excellence in public safety by investing in neighborhood partnerships as well as prevention, enforcement, and emergency preparedness services.

You may speak to the City Council about any discussion item that is on the agenda, and you may also speak during Open Forum on items that are not on the agenda and are within the subject matter jurisdiction of the City Council or Successor Agency to the Redevelopment Agency Board. If you wish to speak to the City Council, please refer to the following guidelines:

- **Fill out a Yellow Speaker's Card and submit it to the City Clerk seated at the front table. Do this before the meeting or before the item is heard.** This will ensure that your name is called for the item(s) that you wish to address, and it will help ensure the meeting runs smoothly for all participants.
- When the Council reaches your item on the agenda, the Mayor will open the public hearing and call your name. Please address the Council from the podium, which is located to the left of the City Clerk's table.
- Each speaker generally has two minutes to speak per item. The amount of time allotted to speakers may vary at the Mayor's discretion, depending on the number of speakers or the length of the agenda.
- To assist you in tracking your speaking time, there is a display on the podium. The green light turns on when you begin speaking; the yellow light turns on when you have 30 seconds left; and the red light turns on when your speaking time is up.

Please be advised that, by law, the City Council is unable to discuss or take action on issues presented during Open Forum. According to State Law (the Brown Act) items must first be noticed on the agenda before any discussion or action.

The San José City Council meets every Tuesday at 1:30 p.m. and Tuesday at 7 p.m. as needed, unless otherwise noted. If you have any questions, please direct them to the City Clerk's staff seated at the tables just below the dais. Thank you for taking the time to attend today's meeting. - (a) For the Mayor, increase the authorized salary from \$114,000 annually to \$125,000 annually;

- (f) Continue to require Councilmembers to pay \$250 for each unexcused absence at scheduled Council meetings, pursuant to City Charter Section 407.

Recommendation: Adopt a resolution directing the Interim Director of Housing to pursue steps necessary to acquire the Plaza Hotel located in San José at 96 South Almaden Boulevard ("Plaza Hotel") from the Successor Agency to the Redevelopment Agency of the City of San José (SARA), for housing the homeless, and return to City Council to obtain authorization to acquire. Recommendation: Consideration of a Conditional Use Permit to allow a drinking establishment (for more than 250 people) and late night use until 2:00 a.m. in an existing 8,684 square foot public eating establishment in the DC Downtown Primary Commercial Zoning District on an approximately 0.15 gross acre site, located on the east side of South 1st Street, approximately 400 feet southerly of East Santa Clara Street (58 South 1st Street). Recommendation: As recommended by the Community and Economic Development Committee on June 22, 2015, accept the report and provide direction on staff's proposed work plan for updating the Envision San José 2040 General Plan (General Plan) text and the provisions of Title 20 of the San José Municipal Code (the Zoning Code) to further the preservation of mobilehome parks. CEQA: Not a Project, File No. PP10-069(a), Staff Reports, Assessments, and Annual Reports. (Planning, Building, and Code Enforcement/Housing)
