City Manager Norberto Dueñas provided an update on storm preparedness measures taking place in Alviso in anticipation of El Niño.

  - (c) Retain the levels of health, dental, life insurance and other benefits in accordance with the benefits provided to management employees in Unit 99.
  - (d) Retain the current retirement benefits offered under the CalPERS Tier 2 Plan and the PTC 457 Defined Contribution Plan.
  - (e) Increase the vehicle allowance from \$350 per month to \$500 per month for the Mayor and each member of the City Council.

(f) Continue to require Councilmembers to pay \$250 for each unexcused absence at scheduled Council meetings, pursuant to City Charter Section 407.

Councilmember Ash Kalra indicated that he would be more comfortable waiting until City employees' pay has been restored before increasing the Council and Mayor's salaries, adding that future decisions regarding salary setting issues should be taken out of Councils' hands. Councilmember Manh Nguyen also expressed what he perceives as a conflict of interest and cannot support the motion on the floor.

Councilmember Tam Nguyen requested an amendment to the motion, referring the issue to Staff to poll for a Charter Amendment which would potentially remove any future Council salary setting decisions from Council. Councilmember Magdalena Carrasco and Vice Mayor Rose Herrera approved the amendment to the motion.

Action: On a call for the question, the motion carried, and Ordinance No. 29679, entitled: "An Ordinance of the City of San José Adopting Salaries and Other Compensation for the Mayor and Councilmembers Recommended by the Salary Setting Commission Pursuant to City Charter Section 407", was passed for publication, with a referral to Staff to poll for a Charter Amendment which would potentially remove any future Council salary setting decisions from Council. (8-3. Noes: Kalra, M. Nguyen, Oliverio.)
