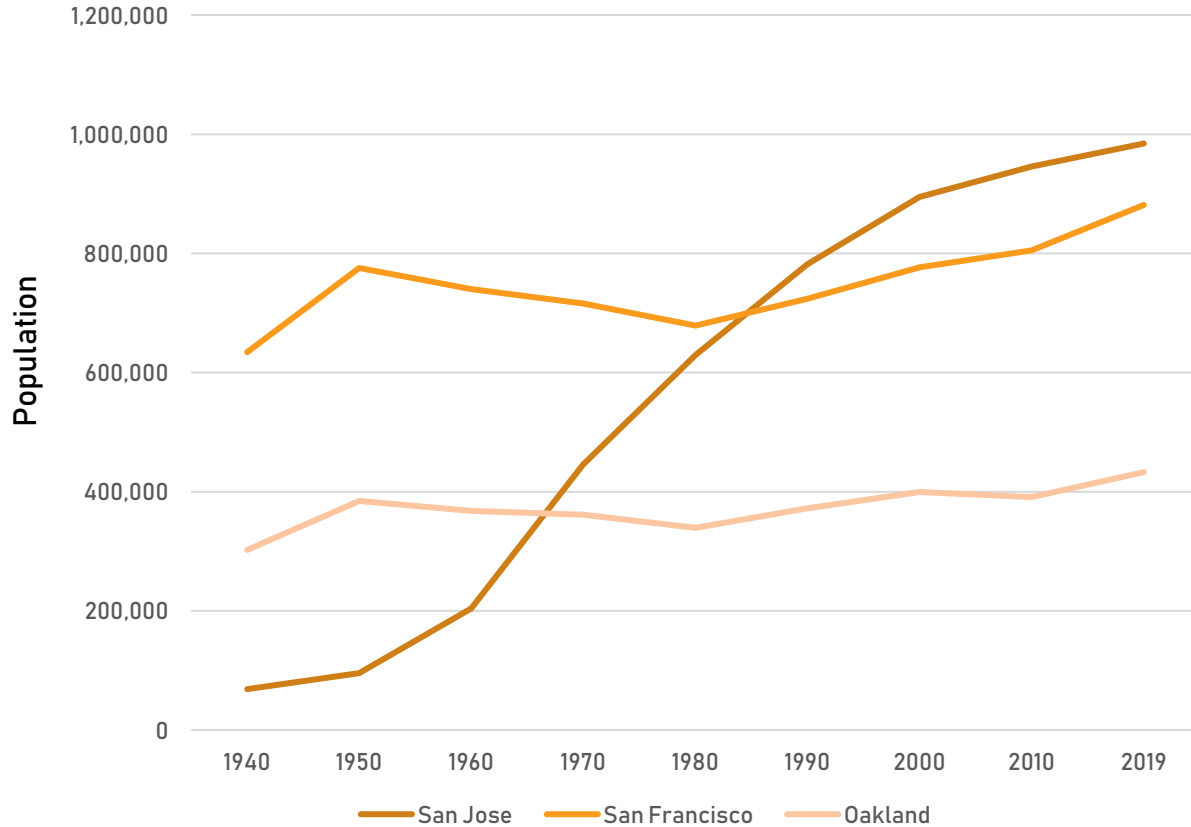

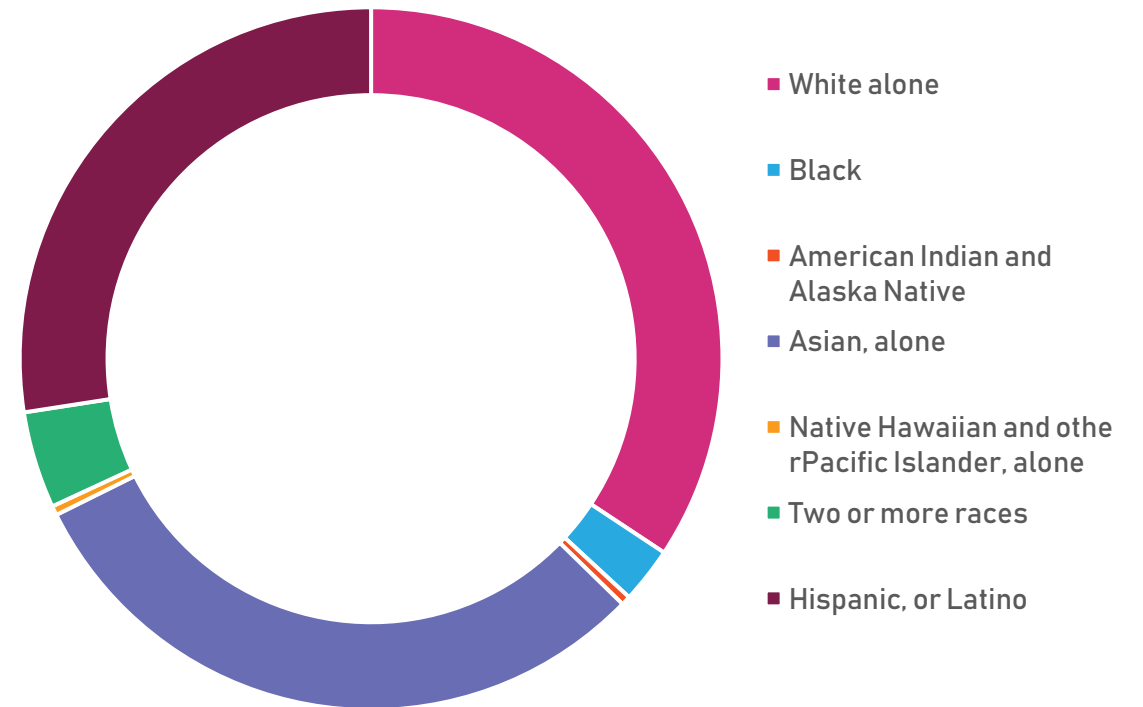
# San José – 1940 to Today

# Safety

In 2019, there were:

**3,412 injuries**

**59 fatalities**

**211 severe injuries**

**847 moderate injuries**

**2,295 minor injuries, and**

**5,366 total crashes**

In San José, the largest segment of traffic fatalities are people who are hit while walking.

Average Pedestrian Fatality Involves:

Average Age: 58 years old

Nearly 1/3 are over 65

Nearly 2/3 were at night

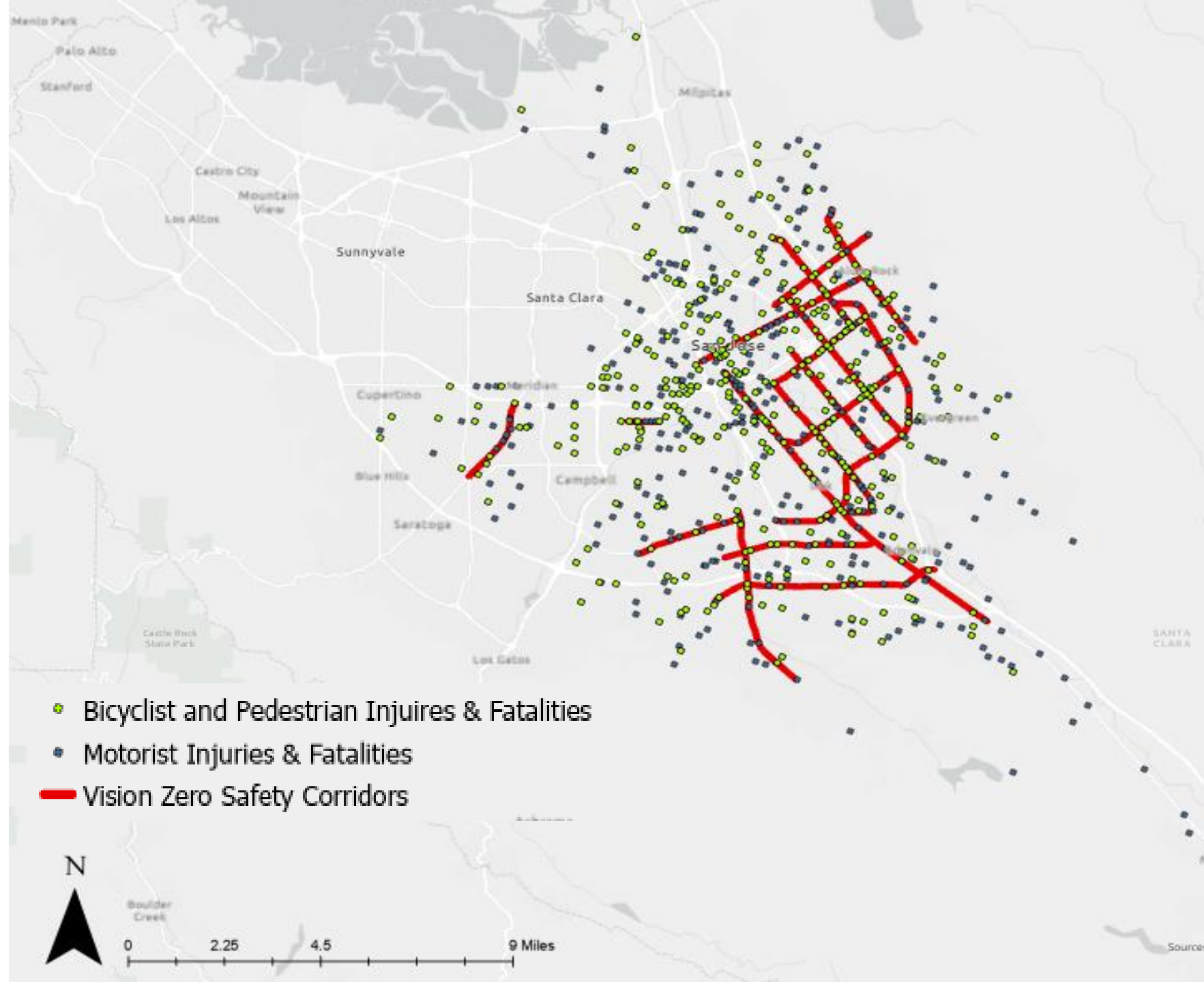
20% most frequent known violation from speeding vehicles

79% occurred outside of crosswalks

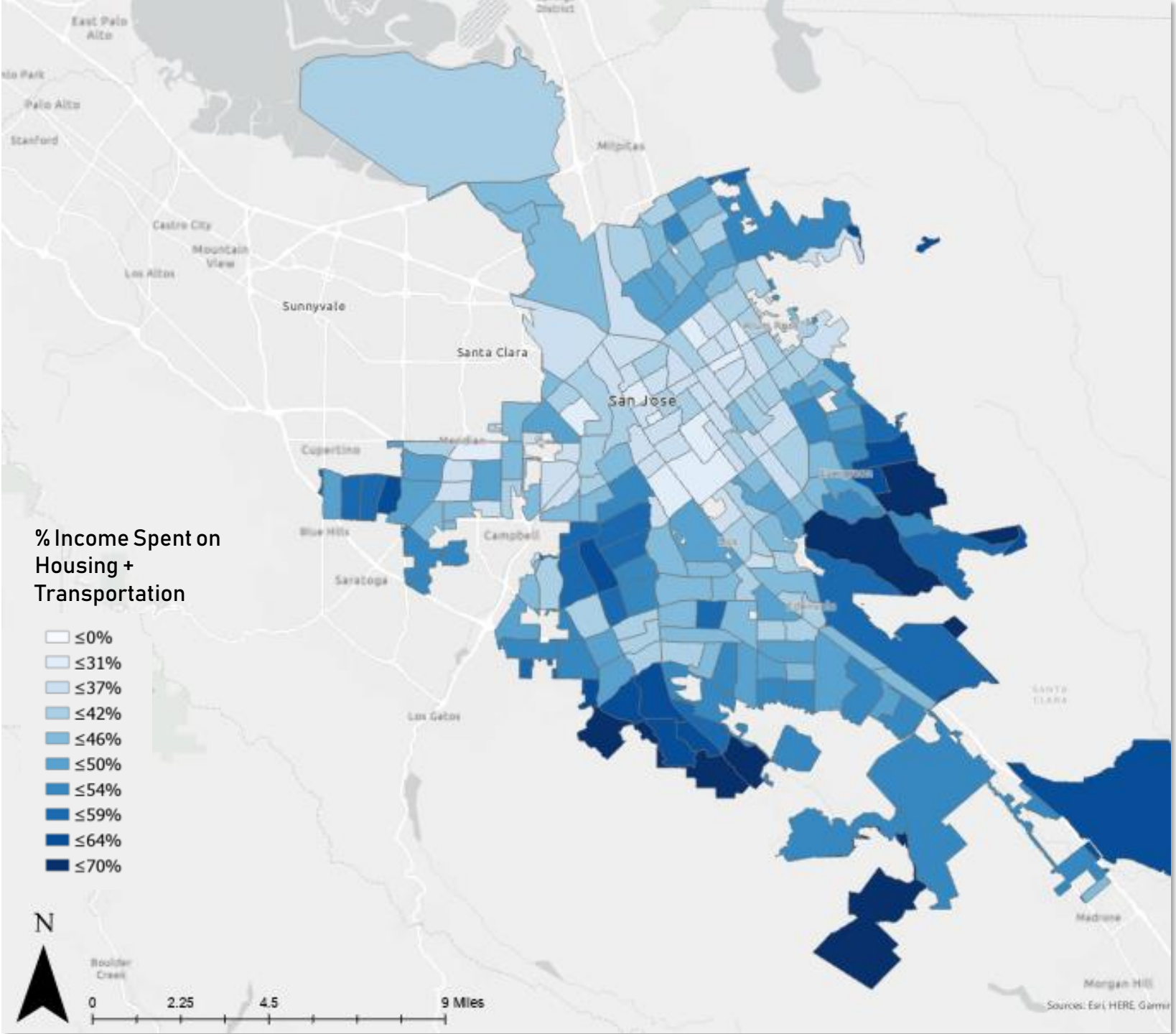

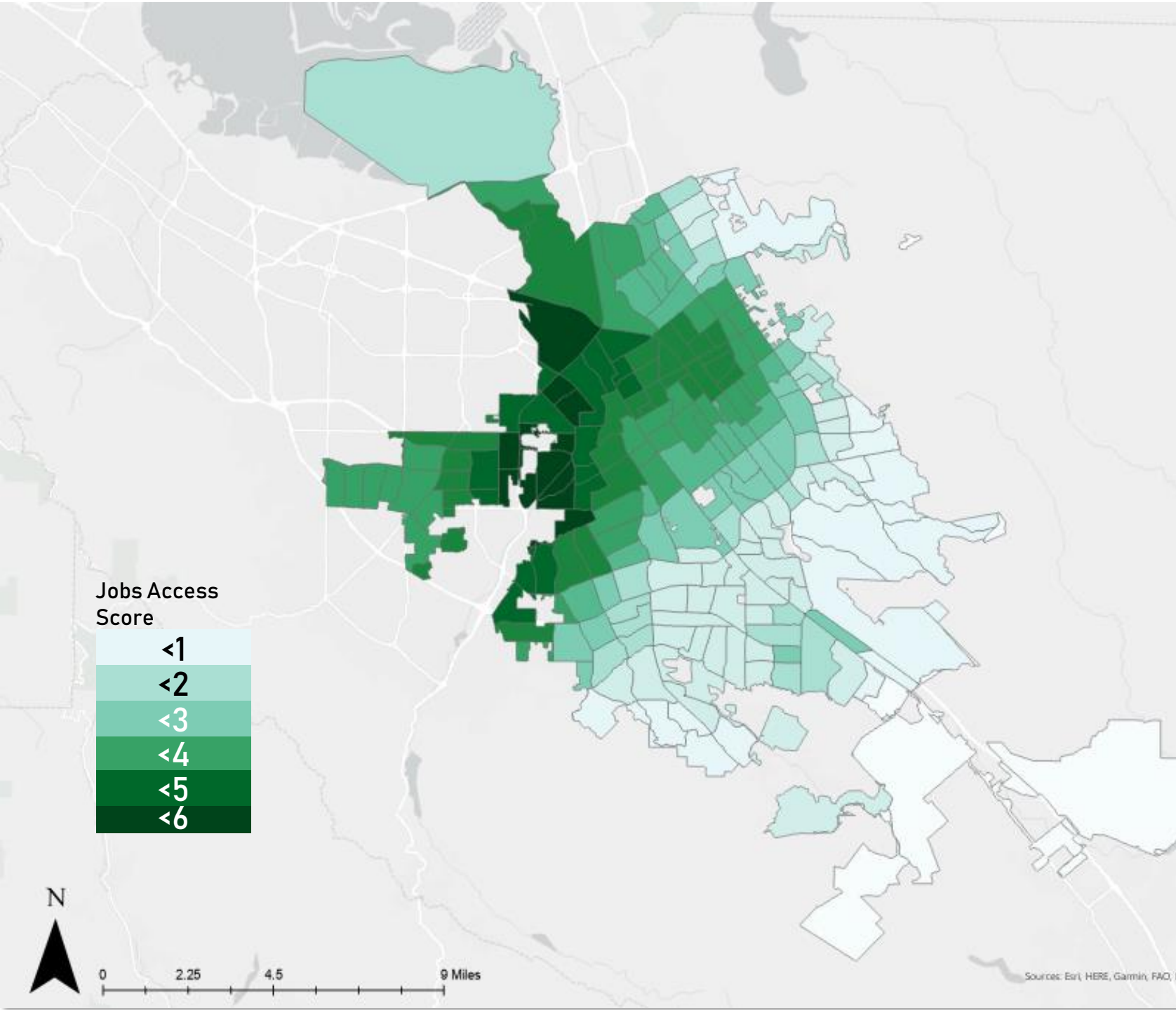

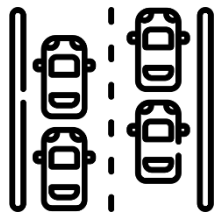
# Time spent driving takes away from life

**158** hours

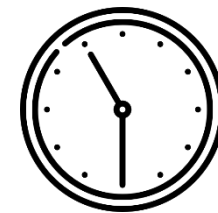
**6.5** days

The City is projected to add 172,000 jobs and 471,000 residents between 2007 and 2040.

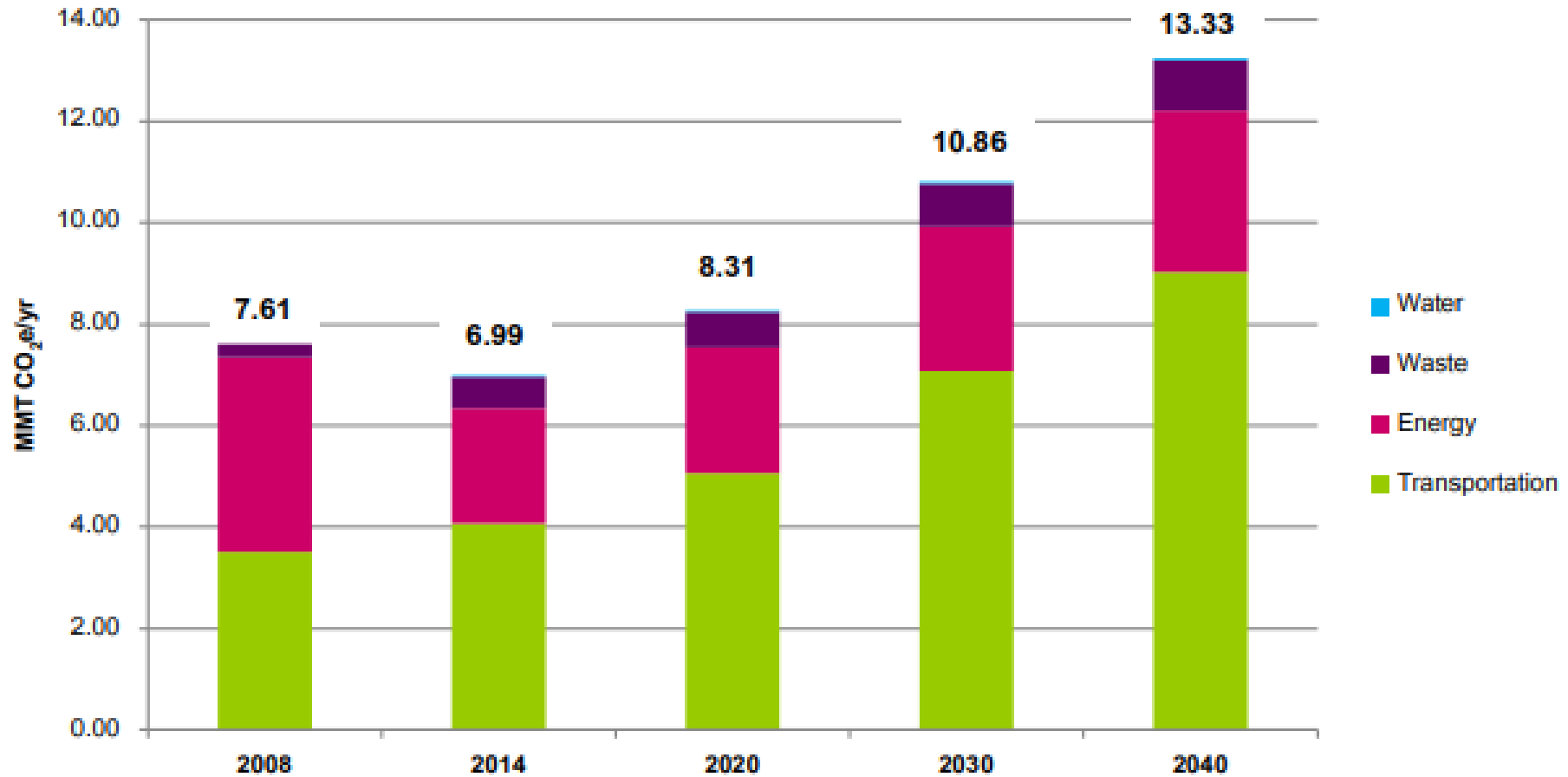
The amount of driving in the City would double, which would make traffic unbearable and make bus service very slow.

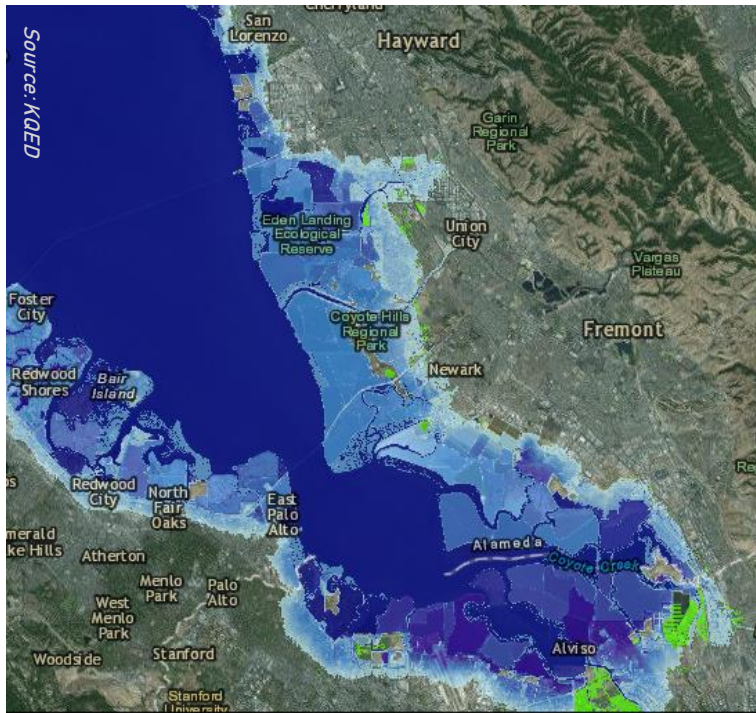
