

Vision Zero Task Force 2. Reports and Updates: A. Key Metrics

Similar to reports in other US cities, traffic volume is down, crashes and injuries are down, but speeding is up due to lower congestion – resulting in KSI and fatalities remaining in range from recent years.

Crash and Injury Data: 2020 vs 2019

Crashes ▼ 28%

Injuries ▼ 31%

Fatal + Severe Injuries (KSI) ▼ 9%



Fatalities caused by Speeding ▲ 117%




2020 Traffic Crashes by Month








Traffic Fatalities2016-2020 by Street User Type

Traffic Fatalities by Street User Type (2016-2020)










Speeding, Red Light Running: Top 2 Known KSI Factors

2016 - 2020 Top Known KSI Factors




Speeding As Primary Factor for Fatality and KSI



- Speeding is the primary factor in almost 3 times as many KSI as Red Light Running
- In 2020, traffic fatalities caused by Speeding more than doubled from 2019

Preliminary Near Miss Insights from Meridian Ave and W San Carlos St Almost 50% of near miss events are on south leg

- 60% involve vehicles going northbound
- 83% involve peds outside crosswalk



San José Police Department Traffic Enforcement Unit

Patrol Division (Staff: 80 shift/day): Crashes and Injuries (CHP 555)

- When crashes and injuries occur, PD collects crash information, injury information, and investigate location and scene of incident
- PD sends completed forms to State (SWITRS) and DOT
- DOT analyzes data, maps data

Traffic Enforcement Unit (Staff: 11): Citations/Warnings/"Special Events"

- Where, When, What time of citation/warning is the focus
- SJPD tracks enforcement activity internally
- Area of increasing coordination under Vision Zero
 - Look Out When It's Dark Out e.g., boards on VZ corridors

SJPD enforcement area is San Jose, including County Expressways, but excluding VTA facilities and some County pockets (where CHP and the County Sheriff cover)



How Vision Zero Uses Police Data

Crashes and Injuries:

- PD reports fatality information and sends CHP 555 reports to DOT
- PD/DOT analyzes and maps crash and injury data
- Tools: PowerBI Crash and Injury map (visionzerosj.org), Urban Logiq Data Dashboard (forthcoming)

Enforcement Activity:

- Work with PD on trends over time and place
- Focus enforcement: e.g., VZ corridors, Daylight Savings Time, ...
- Top 2 known factors contributing to KSI: Speeding, Red Light Running

Method and Project Outline

- 2011 through 2016 data was analyzed for
 - Demographics
 - Cause and manner of death
 - Location of death
 - Medical history
 - Drug use
 - Veteran status
 - Motor vehicle related deaths
- Each case file was reviewed, number of deaths verified, and variables analyzed by the Chief Medical Examiner Michelle A. Jorden, MD, Chief Investigator Rosa Vega, and student intern Karin Wells




Homelessness

 The Medical Examiner-Coroner's Office determines homelessness if the circumstances of the death occurred in an environment to suggest homelessness (e.g. homeless encampment) or the decedent was known to be homeless and/or public record searches do not identify a valid living address




Total Homeless Deaths (2011-2016)





Location of Death






The Aging Homeless Population






Manner of Death






Total Deaths per Season






Causes of Death: Vehicle Accidents






Causes of Death: Drugs and Alcohol






Presence of Methamphetamine and Alcohol





Highlights

- Homeless deaths in Santa Clara County increased 164% over the six-year period. Between 2011 and 2016, the homeless population rose, with the greatest number of deaths occurring in 2016.
- Males and Caucasians where the most predominantly represented.
- Alcohol and methamphetamine were the most commonly abused drugs. Heroin deaths are being monitored given the opioid epidemic.
- The number of deaths of individuals 65 years and older has risen and is expected to rise given the aging baby boomer population.
- A significant percentage of the homeless are continuing to die in homeless encampments and on the streets.



Recommendations

- Access to consistent medical and mental health care services, as well as drug and alcohol services and employment resources are underscored.
- Ensuring that the homeless population has consistent access to drug and alcohol intervention services is warranted.
- The distribution and use of Narcan (naloxone) should be considered in this population to prevent overdoses.
- Preventive healthcare in the form of vaccines (pneumonia/shingles), as well as treating chronic medical conditions such as hypertension and diabetes is underscored for the older population.
- We must remember and be sensitive to those with pets, as well as transgender and LGBTQ issues that may affect this population.





















































Abbreviated Injury Scale (AIS)

- Created in 1969 by Association for the Advancement of Automotive Medicine (AAAM)
- Type
- Location
- Severity
 - 1 Minor
 - 2 Moderate
 - 3 Serious
 - 4 Severe
 - 5 Critical
 - 6 Maximum



Injury Severity Score

Highest AIS severity code in each of the three most severely injured ISS body regions

- Head or neck including cervical spine
- Face including the facial skeleton, nose, mouth, eyes and ears
- Chest thoracic spine and diaphragm
- Abdomen or pelvic contents abdominal organs and lumbar spine
- Extremities or pelvic girdle pelvic skeleton
- External

Vision Zero Task Force

Groundwork to model Vision Zero SF's Public Health data linkage

Vision Zero San Francisco (VZSF) Model

- Vision Zero San Francisco (Public Health) linked crash and injury data (SFPD) with trauma hospital data (Zuckerberg SF General)
- Missing from police records, but in hospital records:
 - All injuries: 20% of pedestrians and 25% of cyclists
 - Severe injuries: 24% of pedestrians, 39% of cyclists, 28% of motor vehicle occupants
- Discrepancies found in Communities of Concern
- San Francisco redrew its Priority Corridors

San Jose Vision Zero and Santa Clara County EMS

- Met with VZSF to request data sharing agreements
- Santa Clara County: could be first county to emulate SF model
- Opportunity to compare crash data with trauma data: equity lens
