Proposed Budget Actions

Office of Economic Development

- Outsource work2future direct client services
- One-time funding to develop a document imaging and records retention system for real estate records
- Continue one-time funding for economic development support and incentives to retain the City's ability to plan and compete for development projects



Office of Economic Development

- Work with the State to maintain the Enterprise Zone program
- Facilitate expansion and attraction of driving industry companies
- Promote policies and programs to support manufacturing
- Launch the new business permitting portal
- Continue to connect employers to trained workers
- Support creative place through events, public art, and support of non-profit art organizations and creative entrepreneurs
- Manage of the City's real estate assets and generate revenue



Expected Service Delivery

Long-Range Planning

- Complete the Diridon Plan and nine other Village Plans
- Initiate additional Village Plans with the goal of completing all ten Village Plans in the next fiscal year
- Complete other activities to facilitate development consistent with the Envision 2040 San José General Plan Update



Long-Range Planning

- Actions to complete the Envision San José 2040 General Plan Update include:
 - Village Plans underway in ten areas
 - Sign Code and Zoning Code amendments
 - Rezone properties along Alum Rock Avenue is currently in progress
 - Develop implementation and financing mechanisms

Service Delivery

- Align staffing levels to ensure customers receive inspection and plan review services within cycle time targets
 - Attracting and retaining qualified staff is challenging
 - Total time to fill positions: 78 days (2012-2013 YTD) plus training
 - Training capacity and training of newly hired staff

Customer Satisfaction

- Continue to improve customer service levels
- Implement targeted process improvements based on Customer Survey and focus groups



Proposed Budget Actions

Development Services

- Customer Service Delivery
 - Net 28 additional positions
- Technology enhancements for customers to improve online access, provide mobile application support, and replace 12-year old permitting system
 - Proposed 2% technology fee
 - Technology project management



Development Services

\$36.5 million business (2013-2014)

- Building, Fire, Planning, and Public Works
- 240 staff deliver service

Expected Service Delivery

Housing

- Fund 431 affordable rental homes
- Proactively respond to homelessness and encampments
- Actively engage neighborhood leaders in the place-based neighborhood initiative
- Provide limited financial assistance for single-family programs using remaining State and federal funds



Proposed Budget Actions

Housing

- Prioritize available funds for deeply affordable housing rental construction
- Homeless Response Team
- Implement 5% across-theboard federal cuts due to sequestration
- Phase out single-family programs (homeownership and rehabilitation)



Housing

- Continue to fund new affordable rental developments
- Increase encampment cleanups and homeless outreach programs
- Continue implementation of place-based neighborhood strategy
- Seek creative financing options and new funding sources
