CITY OF SAN JOSE FISCAL YEAR 2021-22 ANNUAL FEDERAL FUNDING ALLOCATION SPENDING PRIORITIES Posted March 25, 2021

Introduction

The City's Annual Action Plan (AAP) details its funding strategy for the Community Development Block Grant (CDBG), Emergency Solutions Grant (ESG), HOME Investment Partnership (HOME), and Housing Opportunities for People with AIDS (HOPWA) programs each year. Annual Action Plans implement a jurisdiction's Five-Year Consolidated Plan and are developed through significant public input, analysis, and planning. The Action Plan provides spending caps for the different programs or services funded by federal funds.

Prior to publishing the draft 2021-22 AAP, the City is releasing the draft funding priorities for each of the four federal programs for public review and comment. These draft funding priorities are preliminary and may change between their initial release and the final adoption by City Council of the AAP on May 11, 2021.

The 2020-25 Consolidated Plan's four spending priorities over the next five years are to:

- 1. **Prevent and Address Homelessness** Increase housing opportunities and self-sufficiency for homeless populations and assist in the prevention of homelessness for at-risk individuals and families.
- 2. Create and Preserve Affordable Housing Create new affordable housing opportunities and preserve existing affordable housing.
- 3. **Promote Fair Housing** Promote fair housing and lowered barriers to housing.
- 4. **Strengthen and Stabilize Communities** Strengthen and stabilize communities' and help to improve residents' ability to increase their employment prospects and grow their assets.
