ABOUT THE POLICY TEAM

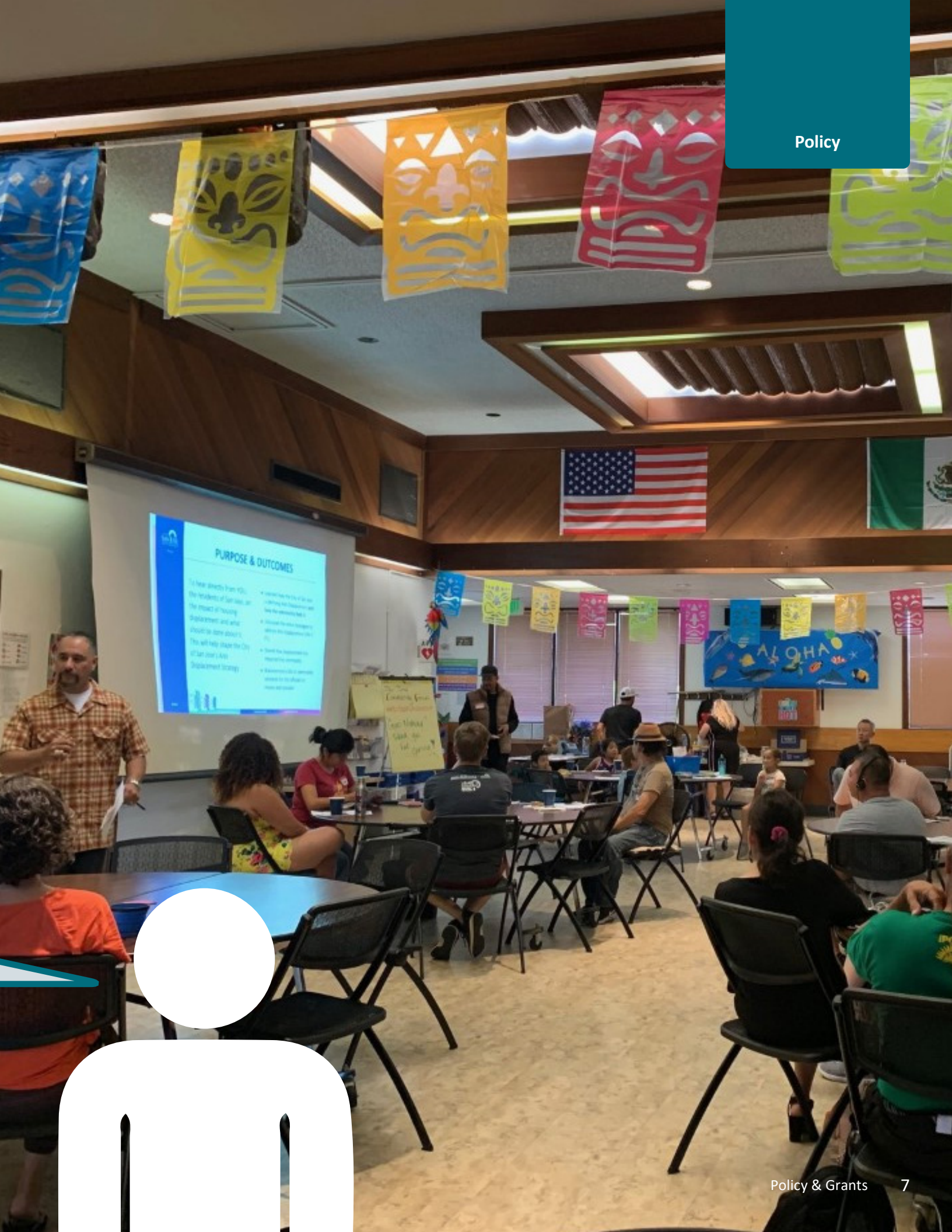

The team's work includes analysis of existing and potential policies related to affordable housing, displacement, Fair Housing, planning and land use, intergovernmental legislation, and many other issues.

PURPOSE & OUTCOMES

To hear directly from HCU, the residents of San Juan, on the impact of housing displacement and what should be done about it. This will help shape the City of San Juan's Anti-Displacement Strategy.

- Understand the risks and opportunities to address the displacement crisis.
- Develop the foundation for the anti-displacement strategy.
- Understand the role of community groups in the development of the strategy.

POLICIES IN PROGRESS IN FISCAL YEAR 2019-2020

Anti-Displacement Strategy

Collaborated with community partners to develop and publish a joint Community Strategy to End Displacement that reflected the community's concerns and ideas; conducted more stakeholder outreach to create draft Citywide Residential Anti-Displacement Strategy.

Assessment of Fair Housing

Conducted community engagement to research fair housing and inform a draft plan for mitigating barriers to fair housing and access to housing opportunities.

Diridon Affordable Housing Implementation Plan

Worked on a plan to integrate restricted affordable housing into the Diridon Station Area, as well as preservation and tenant protection policies.

Affordable Housing Tenant Preferences

Worked on development of policy and legal framework for tenant preferences for affordable housing to prevent displacement.

Moderate-income Housing Strategy

Collaborated with a consultant to identify and analyze possible strategies to create moderate-income housing in San Jose, and analyzed a financing structure involving the issuance of bonds issued by a Joint Powers Authority for low- to moderate-income apartments.

General Plan 4-Year Review

Worked closely with Planning to analyze changes to land use policies affecting affordable housing production to support the GP 4-Year Review process.

Housing Element

Worked with Planning to track City progress toward meeting the City's Regional Housing Need Allocation goals and plan for the next Housing Element cycle that will integrate fair housing into site selection for housing.

Intergovernmental Advocacy

Monitored, analyzed, and advocated on State and Federal legislation in support of affordable housing and ending homelessness.

Quarterly Housing Market Update

Produced quarterly reports with data on the rental and ownership housing markets, including median sale prices of homes, average rental rates, vacancy rates, and affordability levels for workers in San Jose.

GIS Mapping

Designed maps to support policy analysis for the Housing Department's Council actions, and for use of the public through the City's GIS Maps Gallery.
