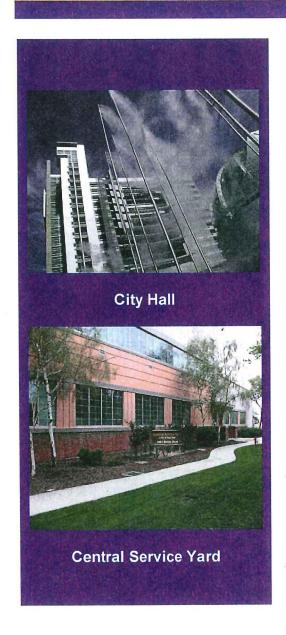

# City Service Area Strategic Support



*Mission:* To effectively develop, manage and safeguard the City's fiscal, physical, technological and human resources to enable and enhance the delivery of City services and projects.

The Strategic Support City Service Area (CSA) is comprised of internal functions that enable the other five CSAs to deliver services to the community and to customers. The partners in the Strategic Support CSA design, build, and maintain City facilities while managing the City's financial and technology systems. The Strategic Support CSA includes the Communications, Municipal Improvements, and Service Yards Capital Programs.

There are several large capital investments in the Strategic Support CSA. The Convention Center Expansion and Renovation project provides funding to demolish the old Dr. Martin Luther King, Jr. Library, construct 125,000 square feet of new Convention Center space, and make improvements to the existing building. Other projects in this CSA provide funding to replace and upgrade the Emergency Uninterrupted Power Supply to provide a redundant system with an adequate battery runtime to provide up to 24 hours of back up power in case of a power outage emergency. Additional equipment will also be purchased for the multi-year, multi-phased City-wide Trunking Radio project in coordination with the Silicon Valley Regional Interoperability Authority.

- Demolition of the old Martin Luther King Library in Fall 2011 for the Convention Center Expansion.

   Communications Center
   Uninterrupted Power Supply upgrade project providing increased reliability in the power system.

Changes to Performance Measures from 2011-2012 Adopted Budget: No

In 2011-2012, the Strategic Support CSA is estimated to deliver 1 of 1 (100%) project on schedule; exceeding the 85% target. The Children's Discovery Museum Dust Collector project was completed on time.

Strategic Support is expected to have two projects achieve final close-out (completion) in 2011-2012. The projects are the Children's Discovery Museum Dust Collector Project and the 9-1-1 Communications Center Uninterrupted Power Supply (UPS) System Upgrade Project. Costs for both projects were under their respective baseline budgets.
