## History of Monterey & Curtner Ave

In 2021 the intersection of Monterey Rd and Curtner Ave / Tully Rd had...

3 Fatal accidents

To reduce future accidents, the City is exploring **preventative options** like...



Traffic fencing / barriers



Intersection safety redesign



Adjusting traffic light timing

To **increase accountability** of major vehicle crimes like hit & runs...



The City plans to **record traffic video** around the intersection

#### How would the City use this data?

### The City **may** use the recorded data for the following...



Support solving violent vehicle crimes including hit & runs, fatal crashes, etc.



Support solving major crimes including human trafficking, sexual assault, car theft etc.



Monitor intersection to improve intersection safety, including adding signs, removing debris, etc.

### The City **would not** use the recorded data for the following...



Catch minor traffic violations, including running a red light, speeding, etc.



Support solving minor crimes / complaints including minor drug offenses, graffiti, loitering, noise complaints, etc.



Automate decision making without human input and oversight

# What data would the City collect?

The city would record 24/7 HD video (no audio) at and around the intersection from all angles,


#### The video would collect the following...

- Pictures of people, potentially their faces
- Pictures of cars, bikes and other vehicles
- Any other object that is near or in the intersection

#### The video would automatically identify...

- License plate numbers
- Types of vehicles, including make & model
- Collision events and potential collisions

Video would not automatically identify faces



Example of what data the City would collect (Picture does not show actual footage of Monterey & Curtner intersection)

# How long would the City keep the data?



General video footage – 1 year



Non-video information collected (e.g., license plate numbers, traffic metrics) – **2 years** 



Footage or data used in a claim filed or pending litigation – **until resolved + ~10 years** (may vary depending on litigation type)

# How would I know the City is collecting data?



Signs will be visible from the all sides of intersection notifying that cameras are in use. The above sign is just an example, the actual signs may vary.

## Who could access this data?



The City of San José government



Trusted partners as needed to meet data usage purposes – partners can only use data as directed by City, partners cannot sell data

Note: the public may be able to access <u>anonymized</u> portions of the data through a CA Public Records Act Request<sup>1</sup>
