Fair housing protects people in 'protected classes' & with 'protected characteristics'

Federal	California
Race, ethnicity, color, national origin	All federally protected classes
Religion	Gender, gender identity and gender expression
Sex	Sexual orientation
Familial status	Marital status
Disability	Medical conditions
	Military and veteran status
	Age (for people over 40)
	Genetic information
	Ancestry
	Source of income



An Assessment of Fair Housing (AFH) is a required part of Housing Element

- ▲ AFH and strategies to overcome barriers must be integrated into Housing Element per SB 686 (2018)
- ▲ AFH evaluates
 - Enforcement of fair housing laws
 - Patterns of integration and segregation
 - At neighborhood, regional levels
 - Racially or ethnically concentrated areas of poverty
 - Disparities in access to opportunity
 - Disproportionate housing needs





Housing Element's other required components

- Housing Needs Assessment demographic, employment, and housing trends and conditions that affect housing needs
- Evaluation of Past Performance under the prior Housing Element
- ♠ Housing Sites Inventory to meet City's Regional Housing Needs Allocation (RHNA) goal, help dismantle segregation
- ★ Community Outreach and Engagement robust, focus on traditionally underrepresented groups
- Constraints Analysis governmental and nongovernmental barriers to housing development, recommended remedies












Segregation was intentional

Why we need to affirmatively further Fair Housing

- Intergenerational impacts on wealth and opportunity
- ◆ Disparities in neighborhood quality and levels of public investment (impacts in terms of safety, exposure to environmental hazards, access to resources)
- ★ Histories of concentrated poverty in some areas; exclusion in others
- Despite fair housing laws, many neighborhoods are still exclusionary because of lack of affordability and nature of housing types



Where we are in the process: community engagement

- - ~60 meetings
 - 4 large community meetings
 - 15 focus group meetings
 - ~40 stakeholder meetings
 - 476 people engaged in-person & over zoom
 - 648 surveys collected
- Community engagement remaining
 - 1-2 large community meeting(s)
 - ~10 public hearings
 - Additional survey
 - 3-5 focus group meetings





Where we are in the process: strategy development

- Targeted stakeholder engagement to date (started March 2021):
 - 6 Intergovernmental agency meetings
 - 1 Stakeholder Working Group meeting
- Targeted stakeholder engagement remaining
 - 8-10 additional Stakeholder Working Group meetings
 - At least 1 additional intergovernmental agency meeting
 - Individual stakeholder meetings as appropriate






