ABOUT THE PROJECT

This project is a collaboration with DOT Parking, Team San José and the Office of Councilmember Peralez. The project was approved as part of the 5-year Capital Improvement Projects (CIP) Plan in 2018 by the Arts Commission and City Council. The artist drew direct inspiration from a wild herb native to the salt marsh tidal lands of the San Francisco Bay. The artist picked this wild plant from among the endemic and near-endemic indicator species of the Bay's ecological health, as a way to reconnect to the native landscape beneath the City and reassert the human connection to it. This plant was also chosen on aesthetic grounds for the wildly meandering fleshy leaves in its adult plants. Their shapes present a design opportunity to drastically impact the rectilinearity of the Convention Canter space, bringing both movement and focus to that currently dispersive-feeling area.



ABOUT THE ARTIST

Born and raised in the wild and verdant Centovalli region of Ticino, Switzerland, Mona owes her love of botany and the natural form to her childhood's natural surroundings, and to her mother and grandmother's teachings. She mysteriously inherited her style of depicting plants from her grandfather, a botanical illustrator, even though were never close.

Her father, theater set designer Peter Bissegger, also influenced her concern with a visual environment's influence on a viewer's emotions and vitality.

Mona briefly studied English literature at the University of Zurich before relocating to San Francisco, where she attended the Academy of Art University, graduating with honors BFA in illustration.

Through her Weeds projects, she had delved into artwork that combines painting with photography, through the creation of stop-motion mural animations and short videos.
