SJ DTP Workshop Scenario Brainstorming

Question 1: What are some creative "big ideas" for how getting to and around downtown San Jose could look like in the future?

1. Transit

Trolley rides w/ attendant that tells history of DTSJ

Provide transit pass to all downtown employees

Have free buses daily that take people from East SJ and Little Saigon to DT-! (freeway barriers)

Trolley or rail perimeter of downtown (Xmas)

Free easy to use downtown transit-getting around downtown

Transit first, including signal prioritization

Pleasant environment to wait for transit - shade, trees, safe

2. Alternative transportation

Underground LTR and create ped/bike/scoot spaces

Opening 1st and 2nd to ped/bike/transit only and encouraging small business and carts/pop-up events

San Fernando micromobility corridor

Slowing people down – IE better bikeways San Fernando

Making it easier to use scooter, bike, ebike – lockers, secure parking

3. Infrastructure

Hwy 87 becomes a linear park and part of GRPG

Having a freeway between Diridon and downtown seems nuts

Automatic pedestrian signals 24/7

Transit signal priority

Ensure astoundingly good walking to/from Diridon station

Turn streets into side walks

Underground transportation

Close hwy 87 – transform to park

More street closures

Santa Clara 87 exit closed

4. Parking

Ensure people pay each time they park—no discounts/exemptions

Prohibit sale of parking by the month/year

Parking tax

Moving all parking to the edges of downtown

Parking management – good options to drop car and leave it

Use parking space more efficiently Parking pricing

5. Aesthetics

Turn parking lots into public space such as beer garden

An active City Hall area/space

More creative crosswalks planned/designed by community

Lots of public art that is reflective of SJ's cultural history

Every street has shade and pedestrian scale lighting

Only allow building designs that fit our theme. Restrict ugly ones

Encourage street performances with musical instrument installations

Beautiful transportation stations that are public spaces with restau/shops

Lots of gathering space, shaded plazas, parks, fountains

More greenspace in ped plazas

Theme out little sections based on the history of that area

So pleasant that you want to walk, not drive, once you are downtown

Making walking delightful

Trees!

Comfortable places to sit (including for the unhoused)

6. Business environment

Street vendors

Have restaurants and retail along the Guadalupe River

7. Other ideas

Can't ignore COVID-19

Cars allowed on certain days based on odd/even plates

Slow vehicle speeds (15-20mph)

Streets that learn from and show their use patterns

Question 2: What transportation investments or policies would best support the Downtown Transportation Plan's Guiding Principles?

1. Transportation

Financially fund Hop on hop off tours

Transit priority

Not allowing cars in the inner core of DT + making it more walkable

Provide DTSJ residents and employees a Mobility Wallet with annual credit for all forms of travel and parking

Tax cars driving downtown like a toll

Free transportation downtown

Allow cars based on licensed plate odd/even

2. Parking

Parking management-especially off street parking

Parking tax + no monthly/annual parking at all lots/garages + require off-peak discount

Or monthly parking only farther away (not premium spots)

No more parking requirements for SHARKS

Valet services

3. Business Environment

Policies to make it easy for businesses to occupy ground floor retail

Remove barriers to active ground floor retail

Support for pop-up – complimentary with brick and morter business

More pop up spaces (Olivera st in LA as example)

Al fresco - policy that is more condusive to mobile vendors

Vendors who can move to meet people where they are

Support micro business

Allow restaurants on sidewalks

More support of small retail, pop-ups, mobile vendors

4. Aesthetics

Policy to support arts and music in public space

Support vibrancy and safety of public space

No additional billboards!

Cultural review board for downtown

Adaptive public space – including vendors

Activation of vacant retail space

5. Other suggestions

Require very high density near rail stops

Open source data on street activity

Creative uses of the street itself (not just sidewalk)

Limit the number of driveway crossing of the sidewalk on every block face
