

Mayor's Gang Prevention Task Force

Established in 1991, the MGPTF is an interagency collaboration whose mission is to reduce gang activity by providing safe opportunities for youth and their families to be successful and productive in their homes, schools and neighborhoods.

The MGPTF is comprised of representatives from over 150 community and faith-based organizations working with law enforcement and City and County programs to prevent and intervene in youth gang issues.

The Task Force's work encompasses a continuum of gang prevention, intervention and rehabilitation services. It has been recognized as a national model, a true example of collective impact.

Safe School Campus Initiative



Safe Schools Campus Initiative (SSCI) is a partnership between the City of San José, San José Police Department, local school districts, and Santa Clara County Probation.

Through SSCI, staff coordinate a crisis response and communication protocol aimed at preventing and deescalating violent incidents on and around school campuses. SSCI staff provide citywide gang mediation and intervention to reduce violence, identify and reach out to youth involved in gangs.



Our Late Night Gym series operates four nights a week at four different locations around the city. These locations are embedded in hot spots and are designed to give youth a safe place to recreate. The series offers various athletic and recreational activities, as well as hot meals to the youth. Guest speakers educate attendees on various resources accessible to them throughout Santa Clara County.



This program provides services to high-risk, gang-impacted females ages 11–24 who have been impacted by the justice system, attend alternative schools, and/or have been referred to the Female Intervention Team to participate in programs and services. The team provides specialized services to girls and women in areas of delinquency prevention and gang intervention and diversion, utilizing an education curriculum informed by and addressing issues specific to young girls.



Operating under the SJDIGI umbrella, this program offers several courses designed to educate and engage youth through digital media. Participants acquire the skills to express themselves through the art of music production, recording, graphic design, and video. Upon completion of the eight-week program, participants receive access to the Roosevelt audio production facility where they may schedule times to work on their own projects. By providing an outlet for young voices, we aim to cultivate their personal vision and empower them via creativity and artistic expression.

Trauma To Triumph

The City of San José created the Trauma to Triumph program in partnership with the Santa Clara Valley Medical Center to reach victims of gang violence within 48 hours of admission to the hospital, connecting them with critical services that can help break the cycle of violence.
