2020-25 Consolidated Plan Goals

- ▲ Increase housing opportunities and self-sufficiency for homeless populations and assist in the prevention of homelessness for at-risk individuals and families.
- ♠ Create new affordable housing opportunities and preserve existing affordable housing.
- ♠ Promote fair housing and lowered barriers to housing
- ◆ Strengthen and stabilize communities' conditions and help to improve residents' opportunities such as the ability to increase their employment prospects and grow their assets.



FY 2023-2024 Action Plan Highlights

- Housing Department invited qualified organizations to submit proposals to oversee various programs funded by the CDBG, ESG, and HOPWA Program funds for FY 2023-2024 and FY 2024-2025
- Qualified organizations applied for only the programs they were interested in administering. Applications were accepted for the following programs:
 - Neighborhood Engagement (CDBG)
 - Fair Housing Legal Services (CDBG)
 - Senior Nutrition (CDBG)
 - Minor Home Repair (CDBG)
 - Rental Assistance and Support Services (HOPWA)
 - Homeless Citywide Outreach (ESG and CDBG)



FY 2023-2024 Action Plan Highlights

- ■ Proposals were due on February 24, 2023
- ♠ Applications for each program were reviewed by separate panels in March 2023
- Each panel contained subject matter experts from City and County staff
 - Outreach panel evaluation included a lived experience member
 - Neighborhood engagement panel included a retired Project Sentinel staff member

Reduced Fees During COVID-19 Pandemic

■ To mitigate impacts of the eviction and rent increase moratoria, fees were temporarily reduced for two years

Next Steps

- May 5, 2023: Publication of proposed fees
- May 16, 2023: Initial public hearing of proposed fees
- **▲ June 12, 2023:** Final public hearing of proposed fees
- June 13, 2023: City Council review and approval
- ▲ July 1, 2023: New fees effective





Recommendation

Review the proposed fee structure for Fiscal Year 2023-2024 for the Rent Stabilization Program, as stated below, and recommend that the City Council approve the proposed fees:

- i. Annual Apartment Rent Control Fee: increase from \$65.00 per unit to \$72.00;
- ii. Annual Apartment Non-Rent Control Fee: increase from \$15.00 per unit to \$34.00;
- iii. Annual Mobilehome Rent Control Fee: increase from \$30.00 per unit to \$33.00; and
- iv. Fees in connection with withdrawal of a building under the Ellis Act Ordinance: maintain \$2,833 per unit for up to 10 units and \$951 per unit for over 10 units.
