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

A Citywide Approach – Emergency Housing System

- Existing emergency shelter primarily in City Center
- Expansion of EIH increases equitable distribution & access
- Ongoing efforts Citywide






Improve quality of life for unsheltered individuals and create healthy neighborhoods for all











NARROWING THE GAP TO 'FUNCTIONAL ZERO'

Households Connected to Housing VS New Households Becoming Homeless



For every 1 household housed, another 2.5 became homeless

For every 1 household housed, another 1.7 became homeless

Background Success Comparisons

Prevention

Crisis Response

Solutions

Example: Regional Homelessness Prevention System

Success Rate: 96.6% retention (benchmark: 85%)

Scale: 2.466 households

Example: Emergency Interim Housing

Success Rate: 71% exit to housing* (benchmark: 30%)

Scale: 1,350 people

Example: Supportive Housing

Success Rate: 95.9% retention (benchmark 95%)

Scale: Data in process



*19% of this number exited to temporary housing options and remained off the street, but were not permanently housed.











Governor Newsom Announces \$1 Billion in Homelessness Funding, Launches State's Largest Mobilization of Small Homes

Published: Mar 16, 2023

- State to design, construct & pay for 200 units
- Partner with City to pay for services/operations
- Need willing property owner
- Urgency demands action

Consideration and discussion of EIH for Cherry Avenue Valley Water-owned site – to be considered by City Council on 6/6/23


"Cherry Ave" site

Emergency Housing, a Positive Addition to Communities

- Clean, quiet, wellmaintained
- Supportive alternative to the street while seeking permanent home
- A safe place to connect to services





Emergency Housing Sites = Expanded Shelter Capacity

Aligned with Community Plan to End Homelessness

▶ 493 beds across six sites so far





What is the support around Emergency Interim Housing sites?

EIH: The sites and surrounding areas receive

- CLEAN. Regular trash and upkeep service each week from BeautifySJ (outside) and contractors (inside site)
- SAFE. SJPD response according to severity of risk/harm
- SECURE. All sites have daytime trained staff and overnight security on site. (slide updated/corrected for accuracy per add'l information rec'd after presentation)
- SUPPORTIVE. Staff to provide trauma-informed care and housing navigation support
